Lenten Candles

We light seven candles as we continue on this Lenten journey. We want the light to illumine our path as we seek to be the words and ways of Jesus. We commit to being more infused by the Spirit as we travel.

Even as we know this is good and important work, we recognize that it isn't easy—and we may come upon the shadow side of humanity and some of our own unique darkness.

We will extinguish one candle each time we gather for worship this season, acknowledging that this can be tough and exhausting work. As we approach the desertion and depletion of Good Friday, we also prepare ourselves for the dawn and love of Easter morning...the light that never goes out.

Prayer at the Candles

Holy One, we watch and listen to Jesus this Lenten season. We do so with the expectation that we will be inspired to follow him and echo his words and actions. We pay particular attention to our hands that wipe tears; make music; tremble; prepare food; applaud and lift others up; struggle with carpal tunnel or arthritis; hold others' hands and embrace; sometimes do harm; wash feet; build and repair; touch the earth gently; strain in handcuffs; wring amid nail biting; write letters and make calls; sting from splinters or papercuts; engage in hand-offs, handouts and hand-me-downs; clench in fists; draw-sculpt-carve-paint-stitch-weave; swat; pray; commit to being open and available. Amen.

One of the six seminaries of the United Church of Christ, Eden is a community that seeks God's justice and peace in the world. Eden is welcoming, inclusive and ecumenically diverse. Eden was established in 1850 at Marthasville, Missouri. It was established because a European education was not adequate to prepare pastors for Evangelical churches on the North American frontier. From its beginning, Eden has embodied an ecumenical spirit. Its first graduating class included six Evangelicals as well as a Methodist and a Mennonite. Eden admitted its first African American student in 1933. In 1965, the late Joseph Cardinal Ritter of the Saint Louis Archdiocese became the first Roman Catholic Cardinal to address a graduating class in a Protestant seminary. Today, students from many different denominations are engaged in theological education at Eden as it remains committed to educating faithful and effective leaders for church and society. The seminary counts among its distinguished graduates Reinhold Niebuhr, H. Richard Niebuhr and Walter

Brueggemann. Eden Theological Seminary is committed to the study of theology in the context of the ecumenical Christian community and the contemporary interfaith world. For more information, please visit eden.edu.

Waiting for Rosa

Some speculate, Rosa Parks was chosen because she was an image of respectability. But, alas, there may never be another Rosa. This is not because there will never again be a "respectable" black person victimized, sacrificed, lynched on the altar of White Supremacy. It is because the wider world will, faithfully, find reason to discount us. There doesn't need to be another unblemished lamb. The blood of too many sisters and brothers cries out from the ground asking, begging, pleading to be heeded. Hear the blood of Emmett and Trayvon, of Sandra and Atatiana, of Aiyana and Tamir. Hear the blood of Michael and Amadou, of Botham and Natasha, of Renisha and Breonna. Hear the blood of Jordan and Elijah, of Alexia and Janisha, of Rekia and Bettie. Hear the blood of Murrietta and Genevieve, of Tony and Clemente, of Cynthia and Tanisha. Hear the blood of Gabriella and Maya, of Philando and Oscar, of Aura and Meagan. I'm sorry that your blood was not enough. I'm sorry that your lives were not enough. I'm sorry that your deaths were not enough. I'm sorry that we were not enough.

Enough blood has been spilled. Enough is enough. Politics of respectability failed us in the civil rights movement of the 1960's and it continues to fail us today. Hear the voice of your sister, your brother crying out from the ground and harden not your heart. Hear them, not because they were perfect but because they were human. Fear be damned. Respectability be damned.

God's Loving Paths

Teach me your paths, O Lord, the Psalmist cries.

Teach me your paths! These are powerful words as we take our first steps into the season of Lent.

As we enter Lent, we are invited into humility. We remember that no matter who we are or where we are on life's journey, we still have things to learn. We approach Lent as students of Christ's way. When we agree to be a student, we agree to be transformed. We agree to come out of the period of teaching different than the way we went in, aware that everything new that we learn will change us.

As we enter Lent, we look to Christ, who each year has something new to teach us.

No matter how often we have taken this journey, the Lenten path is waiting for us, and ready to teach us.

The psalm, with its plural "paths" rather than singular "path" reminds us that there is more than one way to embark on the Lenten journey. If you have always approached Lent the same way (by giving up something in particular, or by taking on something in particular, or even by doing nothing unusual at all) try a different path this year. Follow the Holy One in another way and allow yourself to be transformed.

As we enter Lent, we remember that we are never alone. We are always accompanied by The Teacher, who wants for us the renewing and transformation of our minds, hearts, and souls. So, be open to Christ's teaching, be ready to follow a new path if one appears before you.

A prayer to carry with you into Lent:

Teach us in your paths, O Lord! Guide us as we walk and instruct us as we journey. As new paths open before us, help us to follow them with curiosity and joy. Remind us that no matter the path you guide us on, you always desire to lead us in the way of new life. In your name we pray, Amen.
