

Many: We trust the Shepherd.


One: Come, even when it is dark and dreary.



Reaching out with care and kindness

Please read and respond as we have received this request from Rev. Burton**, one of our friends in The Interfaith Partnership of St Louis...where Kevin serves as the UCC representative...

"On Thursday, April 15, Diesha Boyd (34) was murdered and a 7-year-old girl (relationship has officially not been identified by authorities) was wounded in front of our congregation. I respectfully solicit the members of the Board and Cabinet and their representative communities to collect condolences for the

Boyd family and get-well prayers/messages for the 7-year-old. What will be powerful would be to include pictures of the senders (not addresses), so that African Americans victims of violence see that all community members—at least the faith community—care when a life in North City is lost and children of color are harmed. This family was unknown to our congregation until I witnessed her body being transported by the medical examiner. Can we unite to support this family in grief and this child who is recovering from trauma no child should endure but is becoming shockingly routine?"

To expediate responses, IPSTL is heeding Rev. Burton's request to assist. Please email condolences to office@interfaithstl.org—either on behalf of your community or individually, depending on your circumstances. By including a photo, we can creatively mimic the impact of bearing witness together inperson.

He is a Mentor and Visiting Instructor of Applied Theology at Covenant Theological Seminary, a member of the St. Louis Metropolitan Clergy Coalition, Ecumenical Leadership Council, Jennings Clergy Coalition, Baptist Minister's Union of St. Louis and Vicinity, Pastoral Fellowship of St. Louis, and on the Cabinet of the Interfaith Partnership of Greater St. Louis.

Burton is the author of the **Moral State of Black America** and a columnist in several St. Louis Metropolitan area periodicals. **Rev. Burton** is a member of **St. Louis Clean Air Advisory Commission** and is an Advocate for Environmental justice issues. **Burton** is the *President* of the **St. Louis Airport Interfaith Chaplaincy** as well as a member of the **International Association of Civil Aviation Chaplains**.

The Resurrection is Radical

The women were terrified and bowed their faces to the ground, but the men said to them, "Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here, but has risen." - Luke 24:5 (NRSV)

After twelve months of this pandemic, if our greatest desire is to get back to where we were a year ago, we have missed the memo from the Holy Spirit.

The women get the news when they are looking for Jesus' body in the empty tomb. "Why do you look for the living among the dead?" Why do you look backwards for God's future?

If all you want is a sentimental sign of spring, I'm sure you can find a crocus growing in a graveyard somewhere, but the promise of new life is more than that.

What is dead is gone because it has been transformed into something entirely new. So much so that after the resurrection, when Jesus ran into his closest friends, they did not recognize him. They were looking for the living among the dead. They were massaging their memories, clutching to sacred scrapbooks from a pretend past, the kind that grows more perfect the further we are from it. When Jesus actually showed up on the street where they lived, they almost missed him.

New life does not mean more of the same. So why settle for some prepandemic nostalgic normalcy for your church, your children, your institutions, your society, your schools, or your street? Why do you look for the living among the dead?

Resurrection is the radical change that renders our run-of-the-mill desires unrecognizable. Christ is risen and there's no going back.

Prayer: Open my heart to your future, God. Amen.

Pacific Islander and Asian American Ministries Sunday / Break the Silence Sunday

Break the Silence Sunday (BTSS) is an opportunity for survivors of sexual assault to share their stories in a safe and supportive environment. By Breaking the Silence about such assaults, survivors are granted courage and hope.

One of the ways that survivors can be supported in telling their stories is through Strings of Strength. The website: https://breakthesilencesunday.org/strings-of-strength/, says:

*"Strings of Strength is a project to provide comfort items to survivors who share their stories with the Break The Silence Sunday team. More than 800 stories have been shared since BTSS began in 2015, and we wanted to find a way to tangibly honor those stories, to help survivors remember that they are believed, that they are strong, and that they are not alone. By creating shawls, scarves, and other items we hope to be able to provide those who share their story with something soft that will remind them of our common strength as survivors of sexual violence.

HOW IT WORKS

- 1. You (and maybe your group) create items of support like a quilt or prayer shawl.
- 2. You record the initials of the creator, and the fiber content on each item.
- 3. You post them to BTSS (see below).
- 4. We add a nifty little tag with your initials, fiber and care information, and a phrase of love and support (currently it will have the BTSS logo and say something like "your story is heard, believed, and held in love and grace").
- 5. We distribute them to survivors who share their stories at events like church conference meetings.
- 6. You enjoy the connection you've made to a survivor who now feels less alone in the world.
- 7. You create more objects and we repeat this process until rape and sexual violence are no more."
