



Psalter Lesson Psalm 88 (CEB – Common English Bible)

Lord, God of my salvation, by day I cry out, even at night, before you—let my prayer reach you! Turn your ear to my outcry because my whole being is filled with distress; my life is at the very brink of hell. I am considered as one of those plummeting into the pit. I am like those who are beyond help, drifting among the dead, lying in the grave, like dead bodies—those you don't remember anymore, those who are cut off from your power.

You placed me down in the deepest pit, in places dark and deep. Your anger smothers me; you subdue me with it, wave after wave. You've made my friends distant. You've made me disgusting to them. I can't escape. I'm trapped! My eyes are tired of looking at my suffering. I've been calling out to you every day, Lord—I've had my hands outstretched to you!

Do you work wonders for the dead? Do ghosts rise up and give you thanks? Is your faithful love proclaimed in the grave, your faithfulness in the underworld? Are your wonders known in the land of darkness, your righteousness in the land of oblivion?

But I cry out to you, Lord! My prayer meets you first thing in the morning! Why do you reject my very being, Lord? Why do you hide your face from me? Since I was young I've been afflicted, I've been dying. I've endured your terrors. I'm lifeless. Your fiery anger has overwhelmed me; your terrors have destroyed me. They surround me all day long like water; they engulf me completely. You've made my loved ones and companions distant. My only friend is darkness.

Gospel Lesson Luke 8:26-39 (NRSV – New Revised Standard Version) Then they arrived at the country of the Gerasenes, which is opposite Galilee. As he stepped out on land, a man of the city who had demons met him. For a long time he had worn no clothes, and he did not live in a house but in the tombs. When he saw Jesus, he fell down before him and shouted at the top of his voice, "What have you to do with me, Jesus, Son of the Most High God? I beg you, do not torment me"— for Jesus had commanded the unclean spirit to come out of the man. (For many times it had seized him; he was kept under guard and bound with chains and shackles, but he would break the bonds and be driven by the demon into the wilds.) Jesus then asked him, "What is your name?" He said, "Legion"; for many demons had entered him. They begged him not to order them to go back into the abyss.

Now there on the hillside a large herd of swine was feeding; and the demons begged Jesus to let them enter these. So he gave them permission.

Then the demons came out of the man and entered the swine, and the herd rushed down the steep bank into the lake and was drowned.


When the swineherds saw what had happened, they ran off and told it in the city and in the country. Then people came out to see what had happened, and when they came to Jesus, they found the man from whom the demons had gone sitting at the feet of Jesus, clothed and in his right mind. And they were afraid. Those who had seen it told them how the one who had been possessed by demons had been healed. Then all the people of the surrounding country of the Gerasenes asked Jesus to leave them; for they were seized with great fear. So he got into the boat and returned. The man from whom the demons had gone begged that he might be with him; but Jesus sent him away, saying, "Return to your home, and declare how much God has done for you." So he went away, proclaiming throughout the city how much Jesus had done for him.



Lord's Prayer





Everything is Changing

"So do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will bring worries of its own. Today's trouble is enough for today." – Matthew 6:34 (NRSV)

Today's trouble is enough for today.

Jesus, you got that right. You know what the trouble is: a novel coronavirus that has an alarming fraction of the global population ill or dead, and the rest of us hurtling toward lockdown.

Are we allowed to worry now? Are we allowed to stock up on canned soup and toilet paper and ice cream? How exactly will God provide these things if we don't take responsibility for getting them ourselves? Sometimes life provides us with a problem so big, so complex, it is undeniably a today-worry and a tomorrow-worry.

We are at the moment when we know everything is going to change, but we don't yet know how—and that is the hardest part. We know people we love will be taken from us, but we don't know who. We know it will threaten our retirement funds, our livelihoods and jobs, our mental health. We know that it will put some people who are already at the edge, economically and emotionally, over it.

We ask God the ultimate question, "What if it changes everything?"

And God answers, "What if it doesn't?"

Because some things need changing.

Good things can be caught from this pandemic, as well as bad. Already, you are calling friends you haven't talked to in ages or checking in with your mother every day. You are pulling out the watercolors, reading novels again, watching documentaries with your fur person, cuddling your kids.

The pandemic is revealing, once again, what really matters, and what the good gifts of life are that don't arrive by two-day shipping. A particle one-900th thousand times the width of a single human hair has done what we were not able to do by ourselves: stop us in our tracks, personally and communally.

God didn't send this disaster, but God will for damn sure use it.

One of today's lectionary scriptures tells a story from early in Jesus's ministry. Jesus is teaching a group of disciples in a crowded house when his family arrives to cart him away, afraid that he has lost his wits. Jesus speaks against his mother and his brothers then, saying that those who follow the will of God are the ones who are his true family.

In this story, we see Jesus bravely following his inner knowing of God's will for him, instead of the voices that have long told him who and what he is. In his new community of friends and disciples, he knows that he is truly following God's will.

Have you ever had an experience like this? How has your inner knowing of God's will made itself known to you in a community that knows and believes in you? How did you respond?

Learning to hear, trust, and follow the way God's will makes itself known in your life is called discernment. That is why, in the twenty-first century, we in the United Church of Christ call those who are finding their way toward a career in ordained ministry "members in discernment."

Discernment about ministry comes from both the nudge of the inner voice, and the affirmation and challenge of a community. According to the Manual on Ministry, the church "Ordained Ministers belong to both God and the people. They are nurtured and sustained by both; they are responsible to both.... Ordained ministry is ministry of the Church entrusted to individuals; it is not the ministry of individuals acting independently."*

Is the call of God's will in your life an affirmation of what you've always been told about yourself, or is it an opportunity to listen to new voices in a community you've found for yourself later in life? Either way, if you believe you may be called to ordained ministry, ask your pastor to connect you with a representative from your conference or association.
