



From a backyard summer camp for people with intellectual disabilities to a global movement, *Special Olympics* has been changing lives and attitudes since 1968. When people speak of the origin of Special Olympics, they look no further than the first Camp Shriver - founded by Eunice Kennedy Shriver in the early 1960s. They talk of one woman's dream that started in her own backyard. They speak of her vision: how through sports, the lives of people with intellectual disabilities would be transformed and public perceptions would be changed forever.

Back in 1960, a woman from Bethesda, Maryland called Eunice and told her that she was having trouble finding a summer camp for her child with intellectual disability. The child wouldn't be accepted into a mainstream camp, and, at that time, the public education system couldn't figure out what to do with special-needs children never mind supply them with summer activities. Then another woman told her almost the same thing. "Enough," said Eunice.

In Eunice's world, "enough" always meant "do something about it."

The PUCC COVID Team

recently me to review our status and consider future changes. We noted two positive developments: community transmission is declining; and the approval of vaccination for 5-11-year-old children has the potential to curb the spread of the virus. We encourage vaccination for all eligible children as the vaccines have proven to be safe and effective in this age group in clinical trials.

Still of concern is the low vaccination rate and test positivity rate in St. Louis County. However, if community transmission and test positivity rates continue to decline with increasing immunization, we look to transition to more normal interactions after the first of the year. We plan a gradual relaxation of social distancing protocols.

In accord with our spirit of extravagant welcome and our commitment to being an Open and Affirming (ONA) congregation, we will not consider vaccination mandates. Therefore, to provide maximal protection for all worshipers, we will retain masking and contact tracing requirements in the near to intermediate future.

My maternal grandmother was in the hospital. I was 19 years old, a sophomore in college. I came home to visit her. She was not herself – groggy, uncomfortable, agitated. She faded in and out while I was there. She did come out of her funk enough to tell me about the beautiful bouquet that was on her tray table. She perked up for several minutes and couldn't stop talking about them. She told me to read the card. It was from her church.

I decided right then that I would catch the spirit of that care and share it in whatever churches I served in the future.

Later that week, I called Nana's church and told them how meaningful their kindness was to her - and to all of us in the family. I then asked them to please send me a copy of the card. I was grateful to receive it and tucked it away for future use.

The text:

These flowers are a part of God's creation. They come to you from Parkway United Church of Christ. They have heard the organ play and the congregation sing. They have been present for the reading of scripture, the preaching of the Good News and the outpouring of many prayers. And now they come to you to bring peace and blessing from the members and friends of Parkway.

In addition to bringing life and color to someone who needs those gifts, it transports the person right into the center of the sanctuary – among their faith family and the sounds and words and mystery of worship. The sentiment on the card, wafting up out of the flowers, conveys the truth that they matter and that they are blessed. The recipient is in the thoughts and prayers of their people. The echoes of worship can carry the person away from their angst, pain, doubts, grief and/or loneliness for a time. The flowers bring them closer to the Creator.

Thank you to all who have ever donated flowers on Sunday mornings. Know that they are appreciated in the sanctuary and wherever they end up that following week. We all go with them.
