


*Opening Prayer



Video Project Update and Request for Contributions

Parkway has a new video system, which streams Sunday services and other programs. We've eliminated our previous patchwork video system and its many frustrations. If you are Covid-concerned, shut in for other reasons, or a PUCC friend outside of St. Louis, you can now participate directly in worship and the life of our congregation.

Thanks to the team headed by Kent Tallyn that selected the video system, helped install it (at significant savings to the church), and continues to refine it as the final components are installed. This system serves us today, and will also help Parkway better serve its members and friends and carry out its mission in the coming years.

This approximately \$30,000 project, which arose unexpectedly because of Covid-19, fell outside of our normal church budget. It is now about two-thirds funded. About half of the project was funded out of memorial funds (primarily the Ruth Murray fund), and we have received another \$3,850 in special gifts from members. Remaining final payments in the range of \$10,000 will become due after audio enhancements are installed, hopefully in May.

3. Notify both UCF and Dawn Friedmann, Parkway's bookkeeper (dawn@parkwayucc.org) once you have requested the transfer. In this notice, you can specify any particular uses for the funds (e.g., the video project).

After this process is complete, your donated stocks will be immediately sold, and the proceeds will be deposited into Parkway's account at UCF. Because UCF is a non-profit and ministry of the UCC, it does not charge for its services, although an SEC fee and broker fee is applied at the time of sale. Your gift will be acknowledged in writing by PUCC. The amount of a charitable tax deduction is usually based on the average price of the security on the date of donation. Of course, you should consult your tax advisor regarding all tax issues including charitable deductions.

UCC Issues Appeal for Ukraine

Members of the United Church of Christ are joining the global community to respond to the events unfolding in Ukraine. We are praying for Ukraine, for peace and for the many displaced people on the move. We give thanks for the host countries providing refuge and humanitarian aid. We are adding our resources to ensure that all can have access to safety and shelter.

The UCC, through Global H.O.P.E. and Global Ministries, is collaborating with Act Alliance (actalliance.org) and the Reformed Church of Hungary to bring aid to Ukraine. RCH is responding to the situation in the war-torn country through its agency, Hungarian Reformed Church (https://reformatus.hu/english/news/emergency-response-for-ukraine/)
This group has been offering humanitarian assistance since Russian troops first attacked Ukraine on February 24. It's working with elderly and other vulnerable communities inside the country who have not been able to leave, including immigrants and migrant populations who are experiencing difficulties crossing into other European countries. HRCA is also working with refugees who are leaving the country.

We are particularly grateful the Reformed Church of Hungary is prioritizing care of vulnerable populations who are unable to leave Ukraine for multiple reasons. The elderly and other internally displaced persons have emerging needs requiring attention."

Gifts to the **UCC Ukraine Emergency Appeal** provide shelter, food and other care to war refugees and internally displaced people. It also will help refugees and asylum seekers from African, Middle Eastern and other countries who had sought refuge in Ukraine and now are twice displaced, as well as other citizens of more than 125 countries living in Ukraine. https://support.ucc.org/global-h-o-p-e/ukraine-emergency-appeal

The UCC's advocacy office in Washington, D.C., is encouraging people to urge the Biden administration to bolster support for Ukrainians by:

- + Providing significant humanitarian assistance, both in terms of financial support and operational personnel.
- + Rebuilding a robust, well-resourced refugee program that can effectively process refugees from a variety of regions across the globe, including Ukraine.
- + Designating Ukraine for Deferred Enforced Departure (DED) or Temporary Protected Status (TPS) to protect Ukrainians already in the U.S.
- + Granting Special Student Relief (SSR) to allow eligible students from Ukraine to remain in the U.S.

Eden Seminary

Eden Theological Seminary is a graduate school preparing women and men for ordained Christian ministry. One of the six seminaries of the United Church of Christ, Eden is a community that seeks God's justice and peace in the world. Eden is welcoming, inclusive and ecumenically diverse. Eden was established in 1850 at Marthasville, Missouri. It was established because a European education was not adequate to prepare pastors for Evangelical churches on the North American frontier. From its beginning, Eden has embodied an ecumenical spirit. Its first graduating class included six Evangelicals as well as a Methodist and a Mennonite.

Eden admitted its first African American student in 1933. In 1965, the late Joseph Cardinal Ritter of the Saint Louis Archdiocese became the first Roman Catholic Cardinal to address a graduating class in a Protestant seminary. Today, students from many different denominations are engaged in theological education here. Eden remains committed to educating faithful and effective leaders for church and society. The seminary counts among its distinguished graduates Reinhold and H. Richard Niebuhr and Walter Brueggemann.

3rd Sunday in Lent

March 20, 2022

Isaiah 55:1-9 Open Invitation Amistad Sunday

Among the resolutions at the United Church of Christ's 2021 General Synod was a resolution declaring racism to be a public health crisis. On this Amistad Sunday, we remember the brave captives aboard a slave ship who took on the system of slavery through the legal system. Nearly two hundred years later, people of faith are still called to address the systems and institutions that perpetuate racism. Only by addressing these systems of oppression can the evil of racism be dismantled. We follow a Christ who himself took on systems and institutions that perpetuated power for a few at the expense of a marginalized many. How is your faith community living out the powerful language of this General Synod resolution? Portions of the resolution follow:

"...WHEREAS "racism is a marriage of racist policies and racist ideas that produces and normalizes racial inequities," in the words of Ibram X. Kendi.

WHEREAS without exception and across generations, racial inequities persist in every system of society—as evidenced through health care access, education, criminal justice, employment, housing, access to food and clean water, services to youth, older adults, and persons with disabilities, organizational leadership, governmental office, voting, and immigration, among many others—and thus a specific anti-racist lens is required for health equity and broader systemic change.

WHEREAS inequities based on race also intersect with other dimensions of identity—such as income, sex, gender, sexuality, citizenship and incarceration status, geographic location and housing status, ability, education, language proficiency, etc.— and thus racial justice is a necessary method from which to respond to other intersecting oppressions impacting health and equity overall.

WHEREAS public health promotes and protects the health of people and the communities and environments in which they live, learn, work and play.

WHEREAS the word crisis comes from the ancient Greek word that means "turning point," and comes from the verb meaning "to decide"—thus connoting a call to change and action.

WHEREAS framing racism as an issue of public health rallies and compels faith communities, organizations, and the government to address the crisis through systemic change, in the same way other threats to public health have been addressed, such as through policies, practices, enforcement, education, and support services...."

"...NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Thirty-Third General Synod of the United Church of Christ declares racism a public health crisis."
