Scripture Luke 10:30-37 (New Revised Standard Version) Harold Cobb Jesus replied, "A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, and fell into the hands of robbers, who stripped him, beat him, and went away, leaving him half dead. Now by chance a priest was going down that road; and when he saw him, he passed by on the other side. So likewise a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side. Luke 13:20-21

And again Jesus said, "To what should I compare the kingdom of God? It is like yeast that a woman took and mixed in with three measures of flour until all of it was leavened."

Jesus said, "Everyone then who hears these words of mine and acts on them will be like a wise man who built his house on rock. Jesus said, "For this reason the kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who wished to settle accounts with his slaves. When he began the reckoning, one who owed him ten thousand talents was brought to him; and, as he could not pay, he ordered him to be sold, together with his wife and children and all his possessions, and payment to be made. So the slave fell on his knees saying, 'Have patience with me, and I will pay you everything.' Out of pity for him, the lord of that slave released him and forgave the debt. But that same slave, as he went out, came upon a fellow slave who owed him a hundred denarii; and seizing him by the throat, he said, 'Pay what you owe.' Then his fellow slave fell down and pleaded with him, 'Have patience with me, and I will pay you.' But he refused; then he went and threw him into prison until he would pay the debt. When his fellow slaves saw what had happened, they were greatly distressed, and they went and reported to their lord all that had taken place."

Luke 15:11-32

Jesus said, "There was a man with two sons. The younger said to his father, 'Father, give me the share of the property that will belong to me.' So he divided his property between them. A few days later the younger son gathered all he had and traveled to a distant country where he squandered his property in dissolute living. When he had spent everything, a severe famine took place throughout the land and he began to be in need. So he went and hired himself out to one of the citizens of that country, who sent him to his fields to feed the pigs. He would gladly have filled himself with the pods that the pigs were eating; and no one gave him anything. But when he came to himself he said, 'How many of my father's hired hands have bread enough and to spare, but here I am dying of hunger! I will get up and go to my father, and I will say to him, "Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you; I am no longer worthy to be called your son; treat me like one of your hired hands." So he set off and went to his father. But while he was still far off, his father saw him and was filled with compassion; he ran and put his arms around him and kissed him. Then the son said to him, 'Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you; I am no longer worthy to be called your son.' But the father said to his slaves, 'Quickly, bring out a robe-the best one-and put it on him; put a ring on his finger and sandals on his feet. And get the fatted calf and kill it, and let us eat and celebrate; for this son of mine was dead and is alive again; he was lost and is found!' And they began to celebrate.

"Now his elder son was in the field; and when he came and approached the house, he heard music and dancing. He called one of the slaves and asked what was going on. He replied, 'Your brother has come, and your father has killed the fatted calf, because he has got him back safe and sound.' Then he became angry and refused to go in. His father came out and began to plead with him. But he answered his father, 'Listen! For all these years I have been working like a slave for you, and I have never disobeyed your command; yet you have never given me even a young goat so that I might celebrate with my friends. But when this son of yours came back, who has devoured your property with prostitutes, you killed the fatted calf for him!' Then the father said to him, 'Son, you are always with me, and all that is mine is yours. But we had to celebrate and rejoice, because this brother of yours was dead and has come to life; he was lost and has been found.'"

Amazing Response To Video System Appeal

On March 9, an email to the congregation explained the status of our video project. This project has equipped the sanctuary with professional video equipment, thereby permitting our services to be transmitted into homes and allowing videos to be used in the sanctuary. Our notice explained that the project was more than half paid, but that approximately \$10,000 remained unpaid on this unbudgeted expense. We invited those who wished to contribute to the project.

You responded—and how!

Several contributions were sent in immediately.

- A member offered an anonymous contribution of \$2,500 if the congregation could raise the additional \$7,500. We announced that "match" offer at the conclusion of worship on Sunday, March 20.
- And when that Sunday's offering was counted, it was found to contain multiple contributions to the video project—submitted even before the "match" offer was announced.

We are now very close to meeting the conditions for the match, and within a few thousand dollars of covering all current installation costs for the video system. Council offers its sincere thanks to the congregation for this amazing and speedy outpouring of generosity.

We continue to accept contributions to close out this project. Since some church reserves were used in the initial payment for the project, any contributions in excess of the currently expected \$10,000 to \$11,000 final payments will be applied to these prior payments, thus allowing the church reserves to be refreshed.

Thank you for this wonderful outpouring of support. It allows Parkway to pay for this important but non-budgeted project without cutting into current programs. And it shows the congregation's enthusiasm for this major improvement to the church's facilities, born of the pandemic, but likely to help the church, its members, and its mission in many ways in the future. **UCC Issues Appeal for Ukraine** Members of the United Church of Christ are joining the global community to respond to the events unfolding in Ukraine. We are praying for Ukraine, for peace and for the many displaced people on the move. We give thanks for the host countries providing refuge and humanitarian aid. We are adding our resources to ensure that all can have access to safety and shelter.

The UCC, through Global H.O.P.E. and Global Ministries, is collaborating with **Act Alliance** (actalliance.org) and the **Reformed Church of Hungary** to bring aid to Ukraine. RCH is responding to the situation in the war-torn country through its agency, Hungarian Reformed Church (https://reformatus.hu/english/news/emergency-response-for-ukraine/) This group has been offering humanitarian assistance since Russian troops first attacked Ukraine on February 24. It's working with elderly and other vulnerable communities inside the country who have not been able to leave, including immigrants and migrant populations who are experiencing difficulties crossing into other European countries. HRCA is also working with refugees who are leaving the country.

We are particularly grateful the Reformed Church of Hungary is prioritizing care of vulnerable populations who are unable to leave Ukraine for multiple reasons. The elderly and other internally displaced persons have emerging needs requiring attention."

Gifts to the **UCC Ukraine Emergency Appeal** provide shelter, food and other care to war refugees and internally displaced people. It also will help refugees and asylum seekers from African, Middle Eastern and other countries who had sought refuge in Ukraine and now are twice displaced, as well as other citizens of more than 125 countries living in Ukraine. https://support.ucc.org/global-h-o-p-e/ukraine-emergency-appeal

March 27, 2022

Luke 15:1-3, 11b-32 *Embracing Love*

Even if you don't know much else from the Bible, it's likely that you have heard the story of the prodigal son. A young man leaves his comfortable family home with his ill-gotten inheritance, only to squander what he has been given on fast living. When he returns to beg forgiveness, he is received with jealous skepticism by his brother and with abundant love by his father.

We usually are invited to hear this story from the point of view of either the careless and morally bankrupt youngest son or the hardworking and resentful eldest. In either reading, we are in need of forgiveness and transformation. Yet, it can sometimes be helpful to place ourselves in this story from another perspective - that of the forgiving father. In so doing, we can see ourselves not merely as those in need of redemption like the two sons, but also as those who are able to offer what is needed for another.

If we are able to shift our point of view in this way, recognizing that sometimes we are the prodigal, sometimes the eldest and sometimes the parent, we begin to see giving and receiving not merely as a one-way street, but as a circle of care, respect and love, in which sometimes we all have need, and sometimes we all can give.

This circle is nowhere more strongly demonstrated than in our yearly One Great Hour of Sharing offering. When you give, One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS) is able to help families around the world become stronger, healthier and better equipped to address hardships and catastrophes that would otherwise leave them destitute and hopeless. And, you do not know when you will be in need of help yourself. Please consider your gift to OGHS this morning as part of the circle of giving and receiving and giving again and then receiving again - the circle into which we have all been invited as people of faith.
