

One: We aren't worthy of love and mercy and grace because we do everything right, because we never make a mistake, never say the wrong thing, never fall on our faces.

Many: We are worthy of love and mercy because we get it wrong, because we fail, because we are weird and wonderful, and don't fit in, because we are outcasts and oddballs.

One: Because we have experienced a pandemic that turned our lives – as we knew them—and our world—as we knew it—upside down and inside out—and it's very possible nothing will ever be the same again.

Many: And that is the whole point of Jesus, of his life and his ministry and his love that wouldn't even stop at death.

To turn the world upside down and inside out and leave it different than it was before.

One: That's also the whole point of Easter—leaving the darkness and coming back to life with a whole new way of thinking about ourselves and each other and the world.

Many: Because the final words Jesus spoke to his long-time friends and followers before his betrayal and arrest, before they knew he would die, were these: "I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another."

One: And that's not meant to be some abstract or generic "love," but a love "just as I have loved you:" compassionate and tangible, as he showed them in everything he did.

Many: That's why being radical and weird and loud, making people uncomfortable and forcing them to look at the way they are living makes Jesus the greatest outcast and oddball of all times.

One: The kind that makes room at the table for everyone – including you and me. That's why the world needs outcasts and oddballs, and of course, more Jesus.

All: Let us worship our God together—Creator, Christ and Spirit.

Scripture Acts 11:1-18 (CEB – Common English Bible)


The apostles and the brothers and sisters throughout Judea heard that even the Gentiles had welcomed God's word. When Peter went up to Jerusalem, the circumcised believers criticized him. They accused him, "You went into the home of the uncircumcised and ate with them!"

Step-by-step. Peter explained what had happened. "I was in the city of Joppa praying when I had a visionary experience. In my vision, I saw something like a large linen sheet being lowered from heaven by its four corners. It came all the way down to me. As I stared at it, wondering what it was, I saw fourlegged animals—including wild beasts—as well as reptiles and wild birds. I heard a voice say, 'Get up, Peter! Kill and eat!' I responded, 'Absolutely not, Lord! Nothing impure or unclean has ever entered my mouth.' The voice from heaven spoke a second time, 'Never consider unclean what God has made pure.' This happened three times, then everything was pulled back into heaven. At that moment three men who had been sent to me from Caesarea arrived at the house where we were staying. The Spirit told me to go with them even though they were Gentiles. These six brothers also went with me. and we entered that man's house. He reported to us how he had seen an angel standing in his house and saying, 'Send to Joppa and summon Simon, who is known as Peter. He will tell you how you and your entire household can be saved.' When I began to speak, the Holy Spirit fell on them, just as the Spirit fell on us in the beginning. I remembered the Lord's words: 'John baptized with water, but you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit.' If God gave them the same gift he gave us who believed in the Lord Jesus Christ, then who am I? Could I stand in God's way?"

Once the apostles and other believers heard this, they calmed down. They praised God and concluded, "So then God has enabled Gentiles to change their hearts and lives so that they might have new life."



Reproductive Justice from United Church of Christ resources...

As a human rights issue, reproductive justice promotes the human right to maintain personal bodily autonomy, have children, not have children, and parent the children we have in safe and sustainable communities.

Since the Supreme Court decision in 1973, *Roe v. Wade*, which constitutionally protected abortion in the U.S., there has been a continued campaign to ban or severely limit access to safe abortion services. Also since that time, the UCC has joined with a multitude other faith groups to protect women's equal and fair access to abortion and family planning. The Supreme Court recently heard arguments in Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization another direct challenge to Roe V. Wade and abortion access in the United States.

The strategies of those seeking to overturn *Roe* have also focused on state legislation. Many states continue to pass more restrictive measures around access to abortion. Among these are: parental consent for minors, bans on specific types of abortion procedures, unusually stringent and burdensome regulations on abortion providers, and funding roadblocks. In 2021 there were more of these laws passed by states than any other year since 1973.

The act of praying with and for someone at an often difficult time of decision is a reminder that one doesn't have to journey alone; it is an act of companionship and love precisely at a time when women and their families may feel very much alone. The prayers below are from our partners at the Religious Coalition of Reproductive Choice (https://rcrc.org/prayers/). They cover numerous topics and come from many different faith traditions. We hope you'll find one that speaks to you.

For Women with Problem Pregnancies | "We pray for women who know that life is beginning within them, who face the agony of wondering what to do when they do not know if they can cope…"

For Partners | "... It might not be my body, It might not be my decision, But I am here: Because she matters to me, Because I care, Because no one should have to do this alone..."

For Men | "... We ask that you would help them be all that you have created them to be. Help them to see themselves as whole persons..."

For Those Who Choose Adoption | "We pray for birth mothers. We ask for informed maturity, compassionate ears and shoulders, and tough love to help them make good choices for themselves and their children…"

For Children in Need | "Help us, Creator of All, to continue to open our hearts and hands to those children in our world whom we can see are motherless, fatherless, hungry, ill, abandoned..."

For Providers of Women's Health Care | "Gracious Provider of Care and Protection, we remember and stand with health care professionals who furnish health care for women."

For Women Coerced and Forced Against Their Will | "God of our lives, help us to find ways to break the silence that perpetuates the cycles of sexual abuse and violence..."

For Women Who Are Immigrants and Seek Refuge | "Gracious God, you who guided Naomi and her family to look for bread in Moab, a foreign land, protect the women everywhere who have to leave behind their home or homelands so that they and their families can survive..."

For Women Who Struggle to Feed and House Their Families | "... But we also acknowledge that there are so many — especially women —who, in these times of an overabundance of low wage jobs, struggle to keep food on their tables and roofs over their heads..."

For Those Called to Elected Leadership | "... You have created and are creating still. Inspire our leaders to follow your teachings. Empower them to engage in conversations that will shed light and compassion. Help them listen to those with whom they disagree..."

For Those Called to Support Elected Officials | "... Merciful One, inspire and renew those called to serve on each staff so that whether seen or unseen, they know that they remain grounded in your care..."

A Chaplain's Prayer | "... Promise yourself, whether or not others understand, you will always be true and faithful to your own deepest self..."

A Protestant Minister's Prayer | "O God, you who are closer and more loving to me than I am to myself: I pray for your blessing as I join this sisterhood of difficult choices. As I sort out my feelings, lead me in the path of healing and resurrection."

Revelations 21:1-6 Imagine Mental Health Sunday

The United Church of Christ Mental Health Network is a special interest group within the UCC that works to reduce stigma and promote the inclusion of people with mental illnesses/brain disorders and their families in the life, leadership, and work of congregations. According to their website: mhnucc.org, "We envision a future in which people with mental illnesses feel welcomed, supported, valued and included in their congregations."

A new curriculum released last autumn describes how a mental health diagnosis intersects and interacts with other parts of persons, bringing both challenge and clarity to the quest for identity.

In a video clip publicizing the curriculum, Rhina Ramos claims her identities as "an immigrant woman, from El Salvador, a lesbian and a Christian." When asked how those identities interact within herself, as well as what others think of her identities, Ramos reflects, "Well, I can get confused because I am all these identities. But people outside me get confused because they tend to see just pieces of it...but I'm a whole person. I'm a whole person who is very colorful!"

In describing his identity, JJ Flag says, "I am both a black male, and one who lives with a physical disability...I navigate the world using a wheelchair because I was born with cerebral palsy. Being both a black man who has a disability, it's interesting to see how those two things play out in my life...It was the Jewish philosopher Emmanuel Levinas that said, "if you want to see what God looks like, look into the face of the other." He continues, "I have sat down and really toyed with the idea, "What would it mean to get to heaven and God be a direct reflection of who I am? People talk about 'when one day you'll get to heaven and you'll be walking around.' And I'm like, 'what if I get there and God's ROLLing around?'"

David Finnegan Hosey reflects, "A lot of my identities are at the intersection of advantages I'm given. White, male, cisgender, straight - and a lot of those forms of identities that tend to carry a lot of power within our society are really quite fragile. I mean, you get kicked out of the boy's club really quick when you break down crying every five minutes because you're having a bipolar episode."
