Scripture Luke 8:26-39 (NRSV – New Revised Standard Version) Then they arrived at the country of the Gerasenes, which is opposite Galilee. As Jesus stepped out on land, a man of the city who had demons met him. For a long time he had worn no clothes, and he did not live in a house but in the tombs. When he saw Jesus, he fell down before him and shouted at the top of his voice, "What have you to do with me. Jesus, Son of the Most High God? I beg vou, do not torment me"- for Jesus had commanded the unclean spirit to come out of the man. (For many times it had seized him; he was kept under guard and bound with chains and shackles, but he would break the bonds and be driven by the demon into the wilds.) Jesus then asked him, "What is your name?" He said, "Legion"; for many demons had entered him. They begged him not to order them to go back into the abyss. Now there on the hillside a large herd of swine was feeding; and the demons begged Jesus to let them enter these. So he gave them permission. Then the demons came out of the man and entered the swine, and the herd rushed down the steep bank into the lake and was drowned. When the swineherds saw what had happened, they ran off and told it in the city and in the country. Then people came out to see what had happened, and when they came to Jesus, they found the man from whom the demons had gone sitting at the feet of Jesus, clothed and in his right mind. And they were afraid. Those who had seen it told them how the one who had been possessed by demons had been healed. Then all the people of the surrounding country of the Gerasenes asked Jesus to leave them; for they were seized with great fear. So he got into the boat and returned. The man from whom the demons had gone begged that he might be with him; but Jesus sent him away, saying, "Return to your home, and declare how much God has done for you." So he went away, proclaiming throughout the city how much Jesus had done for him.

Father's Day Litany Leah Schade

One: Today we think of expectant fathers; those who are waiting with joy, and those who are filled with uncertainty and fear. We pray for men who are new fathers, that they may be full partners in caring for and raising their children.

Many: We pray for men who long to parent, but who struggle with infertility. Join their cries with Sarah and Abraham and others.

One: We pray for men who are fathers, either by birth, by adoption, through foster care, or through raising grandchildren. We pray that they may be supported in their parenting by their partners, fellow fathers, their workplaces, supervisors, and other men in their lives; that their children may be provided with sufficient food, shelter, education, and healthcare.

Many: We pray for fathers who have lost children. Comfort them, Holy Spirit, with your everlasting presence and assurance.

One: We pray for fathers who are incarcerated; fathers who have been abusive, hurtful and neglectful; fathers who have left their families. Touch their hearts.

Many: We pray for men who give of themselves not just through childbearing, but with their intellect, skills, gifts, physical abilities. Bless all men, that they may advocate for women to have equal compensation for their work, may be an ally to protect women from abuse and harassment, and may be valued as unique individuals.

One: We pray for people of all genders and sexual orientations, those who are transitioning, and those who are parenting in many forms and in the many ways families come together. Help us to understand who you have created them to be and the gifts they offer in their bodies, minds, and spirits. May those who are in danger be protected during their time of vulnerability, and show us ways to keep them safe.

Many: We pray for boys and men who struggle against a culture of toxic masculinity. We pray for men who strive to protect and advocate for those most vulnerable – children, the poor, God's Creation, the disenfranchised, women, and those men and women whose voices go unheard. May they heed your call to justice.

One: We pray for those for whom this is a day of mourning and sadness. For those who have lost fathers and other important men in their lives, that they may be comforted with the peace that passes all understanding. Surround them with your peace.

Many: We give thanks for men who have been our father, grandfathers, uncles, brothers, sons, husbands, life-partners, and friends. We give thanks for women who have had to serve as both mother and father as a single parent for their children. We pray for men who strive to reflect the caring, affection, nurturing, and friendship modeled by so many who have gone before us.

All: Give them your grace and bless them in their lives. Hold all of us together as one human family. Hear us, Loving God. Amen.

Environmental Inspiration: The Honorable Harvest

(From **Braiding Sweetgrass** - Indigenous Wisdom, Scientific Knowledge, and the Teachings of Plants). This is the book chosen by the TED reading group.

The guidelines for the Honorable Harvest are not written down, or even consistently spoken of as a whole – they are reinforced in small acts of daily life. But if you were to list them, they might look something like this:

- Know the ways of the ones who take care of you, so that you may take care of them (weed, water, gather rocks, etc.)
- Introduce yourself. Be accountable as the one who comes asking for life.
- Ask permission before taking. Abide by the answer.
- Never take the first. Never take the last.
- Take only what you need.
- Take only that which is given.
- Never take more than half. Leave some for others.
- Harvest in a way that minimizes harm.
- Use it respectfully. Never waste what you have taken.
- Share,
- Give thanks for what you have been given.
- Give a gift, in reciprocity for what you have taken.
- Sustain the ones who sustain you and the earth will last forever.

Indigenous People live their life by this rule of Honorable Harvest. At the level of human interactions, we do this. It's what we teach our kids. If you're visiting your sweet grandma and she offers you homemade cookies on her favorite china plate, you know what to do. You accept them with many "thank yous" and cherish the relationship. You gratefully take what has been given. You wouldn't dream of breaking into her pantry and taking all the cookies without invitation, grabbing her china plate for good measure. That would be, at a minimum, a breach of good manners, a betrayal of the loving relationship. Your grandma would be heartbroken, and not inclined to bake more cookies for you any time soon. As a culture though, we seem unable to extend these good manners to the natural world.

The DISHONORABLE Harvest has become a way of life – we take what doesn't belong to us and destroy it beyond repair. There are too many examples of this to list here. They are gifts from our sweet Grandmother Earth, which we take without asking. HOW DO WE FIND THE HONORABLE HARVEST AGAIN?

Today is JUNETEENTH

Juneteenth (a combination of the words "June" and "nineteenth") is a federal holiday in the United States commemorating emancipation of enslaved African Americans. It is also often observed for celebrating African-American culture. Originating in Galveston, Texas, it has been celebrated annually on June 19 in various parts of the United States since 1865.

The US Senate unanimously passed a resolution on June 15, 2021 to give Juneteenth the legal holiday status. The House overwhelmingly passed it on June 16, 2021. When the president signed it into law on June 17, Juneteenth joined the 11 other federal holidays.

You might also hear today referred to as Juneteenth National Independence Day; Jubilee Day; Emancipation Day; Freedom Day; Black Independence Day.

Cities and States all across the US are realizing the wonderful opportunity we have to come together in appreciation, reconciliation, and commemoration. During Juneteenth we acknowledge the African American spirit and pay tribute to the roles and contributions which have enriched our society.

The juncteenth.com provides a channel in which to connect and unite all whom share the vision of this celebration. Through the efforts of those at the grassroots level, to those on the state and national levels, Juncteenth celebrations are now held in most, if not all, 50 states. Over half have passed some form of legislation establishing Juncteenth as a Special Day of Recognition. Several other states have similar legislation pending. The recognition and honor of Juneteenth extends even beyond our borders. Expatriates, teachers, US military and others have continued their celebrations internationally. We cherish their dedication, as well as each and every one of you, who see the wisdom and vision of an America who comes to terms with truth, acknowledges its mistakes and commits to liberty and *justice for all.*

We live in a different world today. There is no room, nor time, for bigotry, hatred and racism within our own citizenry.

That indeed, is our vision.

2nd Sunday after Pentecost

1 Kings 19:1-4, (5-7), 8-15a In God's Presence *Father's Day*

One of today's lectionary texts tells the story of Elijah, worn out by political maneuvering, isolated and afraid. At the very end of his rope, Elijah was ready to give up. God did not give up on him, though, and spoke to him, giving him clarity and a renewed sense of purpose. Strengthened, he was able to go back out to follow God's way. How about you? Are you also feeling isolated and weary? If so, take heart. God is near! Listen for God's guidance as you remember that your actions and your voice matter now more than ever.

You need look no further for clarity and purpose than the many *Our Faith, Our Vote* resources available online from the Justice and Local Church Ministries advocacy office in Washington DC. There, you will find nonpartisan resources that will help you study issues through the lens of your faith and conscience, as well as get information on how church communities may and may not legally be involved in this congressional election year.

Sandy Sorensen, director of the Justice and Local Church Ministry Washington DC office, advises that churches can legally "hold voter registration drives, take action for democracy protections, and generate voter mobilization as we near midterms — including rides to polls, getting folks registered, etc. It will also be critical in these divisive times to establish relationships with state and local elections officials to support fair elections...Urge legislators to pass democracy protections. Engage in media advocacy around voting rights in your community through op-eds, letters to the editor, social media and other outlets. Learn what your state legislature is doing to change election laws in your state."*

The UCC is a longtime supporter of the Poor People's Campaign, and its actions to ensure equal access to elections, including marches near the date of Juneteenth, which have taken place both on the ground in local cities and online in the past few years. Find out what the Poor People's Campaign has planned in your area, if you would like to connect with others interested in these issues.
