Scripture Hebrews 11:1-31 (CEB – Common English Bible)

Faith is the reality of what we hope for, the proof of what we don't see. The elders in the past were approved because they showed faith.

By faith we understand that the universe has been created by a word from God so that the visible came into existence from the invisible.

By faith Abel offered a better sacrifice to God than Cain, which showed that he was righteous, since God gave approval to him for his gift. Though he died, he's still speaking through faith.

By faith Enoch was taken up so that he didn't see death, and *he wasn't found because God took him up*. He was given approval for having pleased God before he was taken up. It's impossible to please God without faith because the one who draws near to God must believe that he exists and that he rewards people who try to find him.

By faith Noah responded with godly fear when he was warned about events he hadn't seen yet. He built an ark to deliver his household. With his faith, he criticized the world and became an heir of the righteousness that comes from faith.

By faith Abraham obeyed when he was called to go out to a place that he was going to receive as an inheritance. He went out without knowing where he was going.

By faith he lived in the land he had been promised as a stranger. He lived in tents along with Isaac and Jacob, who were coheirs of the same promise. He was looking forward to a city that has foundations, whose architect and builder is God.

By faith even Sarah received the ability to have a child, though she herself was barren and past the age for having children, because she believed that the one who promised was faithful. So descendants were born from one man (and he was as good as dead). They were as many as the number of the stars in the sky and as countless as the grains of sand on the seashore. All these people died in faith without receiving the promises, but they saw the promises from a distance and welcomed them. They confessed that they were strangers and immigrants on earth. People who say this kind of thing make it clear that they are looking for a homeland. If they had been thinking about the country that they had left, they would have had the opportunity to return to it. But at this point in time, they are longing for a better country, that is, a heavenly one. Therefore, God isn't ashamed to be called their God—he has prepared a city for them.

By faith Abraham offered Isaac when he was tested. The one who received the promises was offering his only son. He had been told concerning him, *Your legitimate descendants will come from Isaac.* He figured that God could even raise him from the dead. So in a way he did receive him back from the dead.

By faith Isaac also blessed Jacob and Esau concerning their future.

By faith Jacob blessed each of Joseph's sons as he was dying and *bowed in worship over the head of his staff.*

By faith Joseph recalled the exodus of the Israelites at the end of his life, and gave instructions about burying his bones.

By faith Moses was hidden by his parents for three months when he was born, because they saw that the child was beautiful and they weren't afraid of the king's orders.

By faith Moses refused to be called the son of Pharaoh's daughter when he was grown up. He chose to be mistreated with God's people instead of having the temporary pleasures of sin. He thought that the abuses he suffered for Christ were more valuable than the treasures of Egypt, since he was looking forward to the reward.

By faith he left Egypt without being afraid of the king's anger. He kept on going as if he could see what is invisible.

By faith he kept the Passover and the sprinkling of blood, in order that the destroyer could not touch their firstborn children.

By faith they crossed the Red Sea as if they were on dry land, but when the Egyptians tried it, they were drowned.

By faith Jericho's walls fell after the people marched around them for seven days.

By faith Rahab the prostitute wasn't killed with the disobedient because she welcomed the spies in peace.

Scripture Hebrews 11:32-12:2 (CEB – Common English Bible) What more can I say? I would run out of time if I told you about Gideon, Barak, Samson, Jephthah, David, Samuel, and the prophets. 

All these people didn't receive what was promised, though they were given approval for their faith. God provided something better for us so they wouldn't be made perfect without us.

So then, with endurance, let's also run the race that is laid out in front of us, since we have such a great cloud of witnesses surrounding us. Let's throw off any extra baggage, get rid of the sin that trips us up, and fix our eyes on Jesus, faith's pioneer and perfecter. He endured the cross, ignoring the shame, for the sake of the joy that was laid out in front of him, and sat down at the right side of God's throne.

Alzheimer's News August 2022

The following are excerpts from the "What It's Like Living with Alzheimer's" article in the summer 2022 edition of ALZ Magazine: Five Things People Want You to Know—

- Some days are better than others and that is ok. Everyone has good and bad days, but for those living with dementia or Alzheimer's an "off" day means difficulties with everyday life. Validate the person's efforts to be successful and understand that some tasks or conversations may need to be picked-up at another time.
- 2. You don't need to fear people with Alzheimer's. Much of the stigma surrounding Alzheimer's is rooted in fear. Take the time to learn about it. Knowledge can create empathy and shows you care about the person.
- 3. Don't make assumptions based on a person's diagnosis. An Alzheimer's diagnosis is life-changing, but it's not the end. Don't count a person out. People with the diagnosis will have to adjust routines. A person may experience some deficits, some behavioral or memory problems, but their lives don't stop.
- 4. No two journeys are the same. Recognize and respect how each individual feels and what they need, even if it's the opposite of someone else you know living with dementia. No matter what, each person deserves grace and peace.
- 5. Talk to each person directly. Engage with them the way you always have. It might take them longer to respond or you may have to repeat yourself, but they still need and want to communicate and feel included. They would much prefer to talk and help clarify things that don't make sense rather than being ignored.

Psalm 80:1-2, 8-19 Restore Us

In today's psalm, God's people are envisioned as a vine, planted and carefully tended by God. How might we participate with God in being planters and tenders of the church and its leaders?

Last winter, UCC President John Dorhauer and Pension Board President and CEO Brian Bodager encouraged church members to be vine tenders, as they described one of the crises facing church leadership.

"Seminary and educational debt, the debilitating nature of limited income and the uncertainty of a secure financial future represent a deepening crisis for many pastors in the United Church of Christ," they wrote in a joint letter. The Ministers' Financial Vitality Initiative (MFVI) is a program to help ministers address this problem with practical tools. Participants in the program receive financial gifts of \$9000 for debt reduction, \$1000 to seed a retirement account and the support of a cohort of fellow pastors and financial experts.

The Ministers' Financial Vitality Initiative strengthens ministry in the UCC by:

- increasing and enhancing financial literacy among UCC authorized ministers, with a particular emphasis on ministers from historically underrepresented groups within the denomination;
- assisting UCC ministers and their Ministry settings, Associations, Conferences, and the National Setting of the Church in "breaking the conspiracy of silence" that exists around pastoral finances;
- providing financial assistance to UCC authorized ministers toward repayment of educational and personal debt as well as seeding of pension funds;
- engaging key lay leaders in UCC churches in collaborative efforts to identify and address the connection between pastoral financial challenges and ministry setting financial challenges; and;
- launching a major fundraising campaign to solicit major gifts that will enable the long-term sustainability, and continued expansion of the program
