

Scripture 2 Thessalonians 3:6-13

Brothers and sisters, we command you in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ to stay away from every brother or sister who lives an undisciplined life that is not in line with the traditions that you received from us. Speaker Series: Ways to look at the Supreme Court -- guidance to help lay people understand Supreme Court decisions and trends by Mark Sableman

Sunday, November 20 | 11:15am | Heritage Room & Zoom Mark will discuss these issues: Why we really can't expect the Court to be a "balls and strikes" umpire. Is it all about views of presidential power? What are originalism and literalism theories? What is the progressive alternative to originalism and literalism?

In addition, Mark will analyze First Amendment trends in which we have increasingly seen the court turn away from precedents, which gave speech rights to protect minorities and dissidents, to new doctrines that grant free speech rights to the wealthy, even allowing them to be used to beat down minorities and dissidents. There is also a similar trend in freedom of religion, away from interpretations of the establishment clause, which protect minorities, to interpretations of the free exercise clause, which exempts adherents to majority religions from basic social rules like non-discrimination.

Finally, who is Samuel Alito and can he and others of his persuasion be neutralized by "court packing?"

Alzheimer's and Dementia and Driving Safety

Safety First: Good drivers are alert, think clearly, and make good decisions. When a person with dementia is not able to do these things, he or she should stop driving. But, he or she may not want to stop driving or even think there is a problem.

As a caregiver, you may need to talk with the person about the need to stop driving. Do this in a caring way. Understand how unhappy the person may be to admit that he or she has reached this new stage. A person with some memory loss may be able to drive safely sometimes. But, her or she may not be able to react quickly when faced with a surprise on the road. Someone could get hurt or killed.

Signs that the person should stop driving include new dents and scratches on the car. You may also notice that the person takes I long time to do a simple errand and cannot explain why, which may indicate that her or she got lost. Ask yourself if you would feel comfortable letting the person drive a grandchild or other family member by themselves. If the answer is "no," it may be time to talk with him or her about the need to stop driving.

Here are some ways to stop people with dementia from driving:

Try talking about your concerns with the person.

Take the person for cognitive testing, and let the doctor know about your concerns.

Take him or her to get a driving test.

Hide the car keys, move the car, or disconnect the battery.

If the person with dementia still won't stop driving, ask your Sate Department of Motor Vehicles about a medical review.

10 Questions to Ask Yourself at the Thanksgiving Table Erin Wilson

Some look forward to Thanksgiving with anticipation: family, friends, and planning for the perfect turkey/stuffing/mashed potatoes to gravy ratio. Some dread the coming of the holiday season. Strained or broken relationships, disappointment, and other factors create seasonal stress.

For some, Thanksgiving is a time to shut down. We coach ourselves ahead of time not to mention politics, religion, or that family secret that hasn't been a

secret for years. The Thanksgiving table is the last place in the world that feels safe for our truest selves.

Instead of avoiding everything uncomfortable, Thanksgiving can be a time we embrace some discomfort and make the holiday a gift we give ourselves—an opportunity for self-reflection before Christmas and New Year's. Instead of counting the minutes until dinner is over, we can choose to engage in a different way.

We can't wait for the world to change, or our family to change. Our own change creates a pocket of beauty in the world.

To make the most of the occasion, here are 10 questions to ask yourself at the Thanksgiving table this year:

- Do the people around this table know I love, value, and respect them?
 Have I told them?
- 2. Which person at the table do I wish I knew better? How can I make that happen this year?
- 3. Who thinks so differently than me, that I can't imagine sharing this table with them? How can I bridge that gap this year, even just a little?
- 4. What makes me feel seen and heard? What about those at this table? (They might not be the same things!)
- 5. Who in my community do I have much to learn from? How can I share a table with them?
- 6. Whose perspective is missing from the table? Whose story am I not hearing? How can I expand my circle to include different voices?
- 7. How can I create "Thanksgiving tables"—opportunities to share meals, stories, and gratitude—other times throughout the year?
- 8. Who in my community is doing thankless work that makes life better for me and my neighbors? How can I show them they are seen and valued?
- 9. How have I grown since this time last year? How do I hope to be different next year?
- 10. If I'm at a Thanksgiving table but for any of a thousand reasons wish I wasn't, what kind of connections do I find the most life-giving? What steps can I take now, so next Thanksgiving is a different experience?

Isaiah 65:17-25 Infinite Possibilities Stewardship Sunday

On this Stewardship Sunday, we look ahead with hope and make promises for how we as individuals will contribute to the health of the whole of the body of Christ in the year to come.

Our theme this year, *From Bread and Cup to Faith and Giving*, is a reminder that we give out of the goodness and abundance that we have received from a loving God. Of course, we don't just need this message and reminder at Stewardship time. At all times of year, through scripture, study, prayer and connection with our community and the wider world, we can be recalled back to the God whose love for us overflows. If you would like more resources to encourage your generous response to a gracious God, check out the books and brochures available at uccresources.com.

Everyone in the church would appreciate a copy of the brochure, "What Scripture Says About Giving," a quick and thoughtful guide to how and why to give to the work of the church.

Inspiring Generosity: A Stewardship Resource for the Local Church is a comprehensive guide to year-round stewardship. This 118-page manual is available in either book form or PDF download and features 4 fundraising methods for the local church, including "Consecrating Stewards," as well as chapters on the theological background on the motivation for giving and understanding mission.

The Gifting God: Change the Way You Look at Giving is a small group study that invites you and your small group into an exploration of what scripture has to say about giving, over the course of several weeks or sessions.

For Such a Time As This: A Bible Study for Stewardship in Challenging Times is a guide that helps readers recall the story of Esther and to ponder anew how this story might inform generous giving here and now.
