


Scripture Mark 5:1-20 (NRSV - New Revised Standard Version) They came to the other side of the sea, to the country of the Gerasenes. And when Jesus had stepped out of the boat, immediately a man out of the tombs with an unclean spirit met him. He lived among the tombs; and no one could restrain him any more, even with a chain; for he had often been restrained with shackles and chains, but the chains he wrenched apart, and the shackles he broke in pieces; and no one had the strength to subdue him. Night and day among the tombs and on the mountains he was always howling and bruising himself with stones. When he saw Jesus from a distance, he ran and bowed down before him; and he shouted at the top of his voice, "What have you to do with me, Jesus, Son of the Most High God? I adjure you by God, do not torment me." For he had said to him, "Come out of the man, you unclean spirit!" Then Jesus asked him, "What is your name?" He replied, "My name is Legion; for we are many." He begged him earnestly not to send them out of the country. Now there on the hillside a great herd of swine was feeding; and the unclean spirits begged him, "Send us into the swine; let us enter them." So he gave them permission. And the unclean spirits came out and entered the swine; and the herd, numbering about two thousand, rushed down the steep bank into the sea, and were drowned in the sea.


The swineherds ran off and told it in the city and in the country. Then people came to see what it was that had happened. They came to Jesus and saw the demoniac sitting there, clothed and in his right mind, the very man who had had the legion; and they were afraid. As he was getting into the boat, the man who had been possessed by demons begged him that he might be with him. 

Adventurers ~ Urban Archaeology: Lost Buildings of St. Louis

Pulitzer Arts Foundation, 3716 Washington Boulevard, St Louis MO 63108 Join the PUCC Adventurers on Thursday, Jan. 25th as we visit the Pulitzer Arts Foundation's exhibition *Urban Archaeology: Lost Buildings of St. Louis*. The modern Pulitzer building is accessible, parking is close, and entry is free. We'll meet at Parkway at 9:30am for carpooling or 10:00am at the Pulitzer Arts Foundation. Afterward we'll head to a restaurant for lunch.

This fascinating exhibition brings together salvaged architectural elements from landmark buildings, residential homes, and neighborhood institutions built in St. Louis between 1840 and 1950. The artifacts on display represent important histories of material innovation, labor, and the everyday lives of the people who inhabit the city. The exhibition sheds light on the city's history, revealing complicated legacies of power, wealth, and neglect that shape our experience of the built environment and daily life. Those people with a long history in the St. Louis area will remember many of the buildings from which the artifacts were salvaged. Included is a 15-minute film about St. Louis architecture, demolition, and revitalization, and an opportunity to provide your own input to the exhibit if you'd like. January Sustainability Suggestions

7 Easy Ways to Use Less Plastic

Have you ever thought about all the items we buy in stores or shop for online and how so many are either made of plastic or packaged in plastic? Not blaming the stores, they stock what we buy. But there's the vision of all these items overloading our landfills and slowly degrading into endocrine disruptors such as toxins that can cause cancers and alter the development of our children. Currently, every year, humans produce about 400 million tons of plastic waste (we recycle about 2 million). In the U.S., we average about 300 pounds a year per person. What can we do about that?

We can start at home. In 2024 let's learn ways to use less plastic, even if it's less convenient.

- 1. Skip single use plastic utensils. Stainless steel portable cutlery under \$15 is easy to find.
- 2. Choose compostable or metal straws. I keep a few in my car, because you just never know when they'll throw a plastic straw at you.
- 3. Store food in compostable, reclosable bags. Cleanomic sells various sizes of zip-close bags for around \$12 a box. Cleanomic | Planet-Friendly Cleaning Product for the Entire Home

- 4. Bag your fleece. Turns out that fleece (your beloved ones made from recycled bottles) can shed hundreds of thousands of microfibers every wash. One answer? A Guppyfriend Washing Bag that captures those tiny bits before they get into our rivers and oceans. https://zerowastestore.com/
- 5. Try Earth Breeze (Laundry Detergent ECO SHEETS) or Sheets LaundryClub. Zero plastic waste. Buy online: https://www.earthbreeze.com/ or Laundry Sheets & Cleaning Supplies | Sheets Laundry Club
- 6. Drink from metal water bottles. Try to REFUSE/ or at least REDUCE use of single use plastic water bottles. Enough said!
- 7. Choose restaurants that use paper or cardboard takeout containers. (PLEASE - AT LEAST NO STYROFOAM – ASK FOR AN ALTERNATIVE/ OR OTHER OPTIONS) Customers letting their preferences be known will perhaps encourage restaurants (their owners) to move towards these eco-friendly options.

If we demand it. Companies will respond. Vote with your wallet. Be willing to try something new. Join your sustainability committee in lessening our personal plastic waste in 2024.

January 21, 2024 **Third Sunday after Epiphany** Mark 1:14-20 Follow Me *Ecumenical Sunday*

In today's reading, Jesus calls the disciples to follow him not only to a new line of work (fishing for people instead of fish) but also to a whole new way of life. Centuries later, those who are called to ministry also find themselves not just in a job, but in a vocation or way of living. Helping to navigate the sometimes complicated waters of this vocation is the MESA team of the United Church of Christ's National Offices.

According to their website,*

"Within the United Church of Christ, the *Ministerial Excellence, Support and Authorization team (MESA)*, supports the critical implementation of denominational polity for authorized ministry, especially equipping the Committees on Ministry that determine authorization of those persons who hold or are pursuing ministerial standing.

In other words (to make metaphorical use of "mesa"), the Ministerial Excellence, Support and Authorization team serves as host at the table that is ministry in the United Church of Christ. Gathered at the table are authorized ministers, calling bodies, Associations, Conferences, and Committees on Ministry, to which the MESA team offers support and resources for faithful and effective ministry. Additionally, MESA's role as host includes the encouragement of ongoing conversation regarding issues of ministry in the 21st century. The MESA team works in a collaborative model to meet the needs of those at the table."

All settings in the United Church of Christ, speak to and with each other, rather than for each other. MESA is one of those settings that is ready to be in conversation with you. Maybe, like those first disciples, you hear Christ calling you too. Maybe, like those first disciples, you are ready to change your life as well as your vocation. Maybe, you just have a question or an idea about ministry. Whatever the case, pull up a chair at the table and begin or continue the conversation with MESA today.
