

Scripture Mark 5:24b-34 (CEB - Common English Bible)

A swarm of people were following Jesus, crowding in on him. A woman was there who had been bleeding for twelve years. She had suffered a lot under the care of many doctors, and had spent everything she had without getting any better. In fact, she had gotten worse. Because she had heard about Jesus, she came up behind him in the crowd and touched his clothes. She was thinking, If I can just touch his clothes, I'll be healed. Her bleeding stopped immediately, and she sensed in her body that her illness had been healed. At that very moment, Jesus recognized that power had gone out from him. 

Blessing the Children *Jesus' Hands Were Kind Hands There*









A Woman Healed, A Girl Raised

Unit 7: The Power of the Kingdom

LAST WEEK

Jesus provides the shelter and comfort of God's kingdom when he heals a man with an unclean spirit (Mark 5:1-20).

THIS WEEK

Jesus heals a woman and raises a young girl from the dead (Mark 5:21-43).

Story Summary

A local leader asks Jesus to heal his daughter. On the way, a woman touches Jesus' cloak and is healed from her illness. When Jesus reaches the leader's daughter, she has already died. Jesus raises the daughter from the dead. Jesus meets the needs of a man, a woman, and a child. He meets the needs of the a leader of the synagogue and a poor woman. Jesus is not stopped by the Jewish laws or obstacles. His life-giving power is for everyone, everywhere, at all times.

Practice: Prayer

We can feel confident in boldly approaching God in prayer, just as those in today's Scripture were confident approaching Jesus in person. Bring a concern to Jesus today that you may feel is too small or too embarrassing. He has the power to meet your needs.

The Point

Jesus has the power to heal and bring life.

Bible Nuts & Bolts:

Translation and Interpretation

The Bible was not originally written in a modern language like English. In fact, the Bible was originally written in different ancient languages, including Hebrew and Greek. Over time, people have translated the Bible from these ancient languages into languages we understand today. As a scholar chooses how to express a word, sentence, or passage in a modern language, they use their understanding of the greater context of Scripture to do so. They interpret the original text in the most faithful way possible, but different translators interpret passages in different ways. We can see this when we read the same text in different Bible translations. As we read Scripture, we also bring our own beliefs and life experiences, creating our own interpretations.

NEXT WEEK

Jesus returns to his hometown and finds that there is little faith among them. Jesus then sends out the twelve disciples to heal and spread the good news (Mark 6:1-29).

Going Deeper

As you hear and study these stories each week, consider what God has to say to you and your family. What is God's message to us? Consider the following basic pattern as a way of forming family devotions:

- Light a candle to help you focus this time as "God time." Pray a simple prayer together.
- Take a moment to check in with each other; what are each person's "highs" and "lows" today?
- Read aloud from the Daily Bible Readings from below. Discuss the questions following each.
- End with a blessing, by simply tracing a cross on each other's forehead. The Lord's Prayer is a good way to end your devotion time. If you used a candle, extinguish it as a sign of the end of the devotions.

Note: This is only a suggested pattern. It will vary with your household's context and patterns. What works best for you? First thing in the morning? Over breakfast? Bed time? Be creative and flexible with how you practice and keep your devotions!

Wednesday-Read Psalm 121

God is our help.

- Does God's protection mean we will not experience hard times?
- How do you ask and receive help from God?

The Lord restores us.

- What have you lost that you would like restored?
- In what way have you seen your life or the lives of others restored?

Friday-Read Mark 6:1-6

A prophet comes home.

- Have you been rejected by family, friends, or classmates because of your faith in God or other reasons?
- Why do the people who know us sometimes get embarrassed by us?

Saturday-Read Mark 6:7-16

Jesus sends out the twelve disciples.

- Why did Jesus tell the disciples to leave when people refused to welcome or listen to them?
- How were the disciples able to cast out demons and heal the sick?

January Sustainability Suggestions

7 Easy Ways to Use Less Plastic

Have you ever thought about all the items we buy in stores or shop for online and how so many are either made of plastic or packaged in plastic? Not blaming the stores, they stock what we buy. But there's the vision of all these items overloading our landfills and slowly degrading into endocrine disruptors such as toxins that can cause cancers and alter the development of our children. Currently, every year, humans produce about 400 million tons of plastic waste (we recycle about 2 million). In the U.S., we average about 300 pounds a year per person. What can we do about that?

We can start at home. In 2024 let's learn ways to use less plastic, even if it's less convenient.

1. Skip single use plastic utensils. Stainless steel portable cutlery under \$15 is easy to find.

- 2. Choose compostable or metal straws. I keep a few in my car, because you just never know when they'll throw a plastic straw at you.
- 3. Store food in compostable, reclosable bags. Cleanomic sells various sizes of zip-close bags for around \$12 a box. Cleanomic | Planet-Friendly Cleaning Product for the Entire Home
- 4. Bag your fleece. Turns out that fleece (your beloved ones made from recycled bottles) can shed hundreds of thousands of microfibers every wash. One answer? A Guppyfriend Washing Bag that captures those tiny bits before they get into our rivers and oceans. https://zerowastestore.com/
- 5. Try Earth Breeze (Laundry Detergent ECO SHEETS) or Sheets LaundryClub. Zero plastic waste. Buy online: https://www.earthbreeze.com/ or Laundry Sheets & Cleaning Supplies | Sheets Laundry Club
- 6. Drink from metal water bottles. Try to REFUSE/ or at least REDUCE use of single use plastic water bottles. Enough said!
- 7. Choose restaurants that use paper or cardboard takeout containers. (PLEASE AT LEAST NO STYROFOAM ASK FOR AN ALTERNATIVE/ OR OTHER OPTIONS) Customers letting their preferences be known will perhaps encourage restaurants (their owners) to move towards these eco-friendly options.

If we demand it. Companies will respond. Vote with your wallet. Be willing to try something new. Join your sustainability committee in lessening our personal plastic waste in 2024.

January 28, 2024 **Fourth Sunday after Epiphany** Mark 1:21-28 Power to Do *Health and Human Service Sunday*

In the story today, Jesus casts out an unclean spirit in the temple. As he gazes with love on the broken person in front of him, Jesus thinks only of how that person could be healed. He is not concerned about distracting others from the way things "should be" or making a mess in that holy space. Jesus only lovingly wants to act in ways that bring wholeness where there is brokenness, health where there is illness, community where there is isolation.
