

Sending the Word Home For your spiritual nourishment during the week.

LAST WEEK

Jesus points out that the kingdom of God is one in which those on the margins are lifted up and those in power are brought down (Mark 10:32-52).

THIS WEEK

Jesus arrives in Jerusalem and teaches in the temple. The religious leaders confront him with questions meant to trap him (Mark 12:1-12 [13-17]).

THE POINT

We are called to serve God and build God's kingdom.

BIBLE NUTS & BOLTS

Some passages in Scripture are difficult to understand. Others are easy to understand but difficult to accept. Sometimes it is easier to understand and accept those passages when we view them from their historical perspective. What was acceptable at that time may be different from what is considered acceptable today. We can also consider that the translation from Hebrew, Aramaic, and Greek to English is not necessarily exact. Using Scripture to interpret Scripture, through cross-references, we can get a better idea of the meaning behind difficult passages. The bottom line is that our main focus should be on the central message of the Scriptures: God's redeeming love for all humanity.

PRACTICE: SERVICE

What act of service can you do this week that goes beyond your comfort zone? Reach out to someone different from you, someone you do not know well, in an act of service that shows acceptance and love. Do not seek praise or a thank you.

STORY SUMMARY

After Jesus enters Jerusalem, he spends time teaching in the temple. His teaching opens our eyes to the conflict brewing between Jesus and the religious leaders. He knows that his death is coming, and he uses his time in the temple to tell others what is to come. Jesus tells a parable in which the tenants reject the servants who come to collect the owner's share of produce. Eventually the owner sends his son. The son is seized, killed, and thrown out of the vineyard. Through the characters of this parable, Jesus tells what will happen in the near future: the leaders and authorities will reject and kill him, too.

NEXT WEEK

Jesus denounces the scribes who do not live out the commandments to love God and neighbor, then points out a widow who gives all she has as an example of one who does (Mark 12:28-44).

GOING DEEPER

As you hear and study these stories each week, consider what God has to say to you and your family. What is God's message to us? Consider the following basic pattern as a way of forming family devotions:

- ❖ Light a candle to help you focus this time as "God time." Pray a simple prayer together.
- Take a moment to check in with each other; what are each person's "highs" and "lows" today?
- * Read aloud from the Daily Bible Readings from below. Discuss the questions following each.
- End with a blessing, by simply tracing a cross on each other's forehead. The Lord's Prayer is a good way to end your devotion time. If you used a candle, extinguish it as a sign of the end of the devotions.

Note: This is only a suggested pattern. It will vary with your household's context and patterns. What works best for you? First thing in the morning? Over breakfast? Bedtime? Be creative and flexible with how you practice and keep your devotions!

SUNDAY: Mark 12:13-17

A question is asked about paying taxes. How do you handle it when people challenge your words about Jesus?

MONDAY: Mark 12:18-27

Debate about the resurrection. How does knowing God has things under control help you, despite your questions?

TUESDAY: Mark 12:28-34

The greatest commandment puts God first. How can you show others that you love them as much as you love yourself?

WEDNESDAY: Deuteronomy 6:1-5

Can you follow the commandments? Which commandment is the hardest to keep?

THURSDAY: Leviticus 19:13-18

Loving God includes loving your neighbor. What do these verses tell you about God's justice?

FRIDAY: Hosea 6:1-6

Steadfast love is more important than sacrifice. How can you pursue the knowledge of God?

SATURDAY: Mark 12:35-40

Who is the Son of David? How can you be sure of the authenticity of your spiritual leaders? In what way is Jesus related to David?

In response, we're creating a community space for these amazing youth to swap clothes and connect in the community. When Trans/Queer-identifying youth gather they have the power to validate, represent, connect, and celebrate who they each authentically are, as well as their community. Registration is required, the event and items are free for youth. Out of safety for everyone, **you must register here** to receive the event date, time, and location.

March 3, 2024 Third Sunday in Lent "Beautiful Law" Psalm 19

Today in the United Church of Christ, we celebrate both Amistad Sunday and the first day of UCC Women's Week. As we honor the heroes of the Amistad, we remember the captured people of African descent who spoke up and fought for freedom for themselves and those who would follow. During UCC Women's Week, we give thanks for the women who, long before most congregations would ordain women into ministry, offered lifetimes of service, wisdom, justice work and leadership to local congregations and the wider church.

The Oxford Dictionary defines intersectionality as the interconnected nature of social categorizations such as race, class, and gender as they apply to a given individual or group, regarded as creating overlapping and interdependent systems of discrimination or disadvantage.

On this day, a day to celebrate and honor the accomplishments of women and people of African descent, take a moment to celebrate the 2023 election of Rev. Dr. Karen Georgia Thompson as the first woman woman of African descent to be elected to the UCC's highest office, the office of General Minister and President.

"Rev. Thompson is the third woman nominated for the post, after the Revs. Yvonne Delk (in 1989) and Barbara Brown Zikmund (in 1999), but the first to be elected. A Jamaican immigrant, Thompson is the third person of African descent to serve as leader of the denomination.

'Today, United Church of Christ, we created a first together," she said after the vote. "It won't be the last first."*

Jesus calls us to explore intersectionality, those boundary places where social categories like race, class and gender meet and merge. Rev. Dr. Thompson has bumped into those places all of her life. Now, her leadership will provide new ways for the United Church of Christ to understand our place in the intersections of intersectionality.
