


The Punctuation of Jesus: How and What He Communicates


Scripture Mark 13, selected verses | New Revised Standard Version As Jesus came out of the temple, one of his disciples said to him, 'Look, Teacher, what large stones and what large buildings!' Then Jesus asked him, 'Do you see these great buildings? Not one stone will be left here upon another; all will be thrown down.'

When Jesus was sitting on the Mount of Olives opposite the temple, Peter, James, John, and Andrew asked him privately, 'Tell us, when will this be, and what will be the sign that all these things are about to be accomplished?' Then Jesus began to say to them, 'Beware that no one leads you astray. Many will come in my name and say, "I am he!" and they will lead many astray. When you hear of wars and rumors of wars, do not be alarmed; this must take place, but the end is still to come. For nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom; there will be earthquakes in various places; there will be famines. This is but the beginning of the birth pangs.

'But in those days, after that suffering, the sun will be darkened, and the moon will not give its light, and the stars will be falling from heaven, and the powers in the heavens will be shaken.

'From the fig tree learn its lesson: as soon as its branch becomes tender and puts forth its leaves, you know that summer is near. So also, when you see these things taking place, you know that he is near, at the very gates. Truly I tell you, this generation will not pass away until all these things have taken place. Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will not pass away. 'But about that day or hour no one knows, neither the angels in heaven, nor the Son, but only God. Beware, keep alert; for you do not know when the time will come. It is like a man going on a journey, when he leaves home and puts his slaves in charge, each with his work, and commands the doorkeeper to be on the watch. Therefore, keep awake—for you do not know when the master of the house will come, in the evening, or at midnight, or at cockcrow, or at dawn, or else he may find you asleep when he comes suddenly. And what I say to you I say to all: Keep awake.'



Sending the Word Home For your spiritual nourishment during the week.

LAST WEEK

Jesus denounces the scribes who do not live out the commandments to love God and neighbor, then points out a widow who gives all she has as an example of one who does (Mark 12:28-44).

THIS WEEK

Jesus leaves the public appearances behind and interacts with his inner circle in private, telling them about the end of the age (Mark 13:1-8, 24-37).

THE POINT

Trusting in Jesus, we can do God's work.

BIBLE NUTS & BOLTS

The world to come refers to a future age of global peace. This peace extends to all of creation. Wolves will lie down with lambs and children will play with snakes without any fear of harm (Isaiah 11:6-9). The earth will have no more hunger, war, jealousy, or rivalry. Scripture often describes the time leading up to the world to come as full of violence and upheaval. Although frightening images can be found in these writings, they promise that God is ultimately in charge and God's love will triumph over all of the evil and pain the audience might be experiencing. This promise brings hope in the assurance that Christ will return bringing a world of peace, and God will always be present, even in these times of trial.

STORY SUMMARY

Jesus tells his disciples that the temple in Jerusalem will be destroyed and that they should beware of being led astray. He speaks of an unknown time when the Son of Man will come. Jesus warns that there will be great pain and suffering. He reassures them of God's presence in these times of trial and tribulation. Although there may be pain and suffering, God's love is still in the world. and God will not abandon us. There is hope that Jesus will return and that there will be a time when no one will experience pain or suffering.

PRACTICE: WORSHIP

Look at a clock on the wall or on your phone. Watch a few minutes go by. Worship God who will work out all things in God's time. Set the alarm for a specific time for tomorrow. When it goes off, worship God for the hope we have in Jesus. Continue this each day of the week.

NEXT WEEK

Jesus enters Jerusalem triumphantly but is soon arrested, tried, and crucified. However, Jesus is victorious as he is risen from the dead three days later (Mark 11:1-11; 15:16-39; 16:1-8).

GOING DEEPER

As you hear and study these stories each week, consider what God has to say to you and your family. What is God's message to us? Consider the following basic pattern as a way of forming family devotions:

- Light a candle to help you focus this time as "God time." Pray a simple prayer together.
- Take a moment to check in with each other; what are each person's "highs" and "lows" today?
- * Read aloud from the Daily Bible Readings from below. Discuss the questions following each.
- End with a blessing, by simply tracing a cross on each other's forehead. The Lord's Prayer is a good way to end your devotion time. If you used a candle, extinguish it as a sign of the end of the devotions.

Note: This is only a suggested pattern. It will vary with your household's context and patterns. What works best for you? First thing in the morning? Over breakfast? Bedtime? Be creative and flexible with how you practice and keep your devotions!

DAILY BIBLE READINGS

SUNDAY: Mark 13:24-27

The Son of Man is coming. Where will Jesus appear when he returns? In what way is the end really a new beginning?

MONDAY: Mark 13:28-31

Jesus explains the lesson of the fig tree. What can you be sure of about the Word of God?

TUESDAY: Mark 13:32-37

Believers are warned to keep awake. How are we to wait for Jesus' return? How often do you give thought to Jesus' return?

WEDNESDAY: 1 Thessalonians 5:1-5

We should pay attention to the times and seasons. How do children of light live? What is the Day of the Lord?

THURSDAY: 1 Thessalonians 5:6-11

Believers are advised not to fall asleep. What can you do to comfort someone today?

FRIDAY: Romans 13:11-14

Salvation is near. What do you need to cast off? How do you put on the Lord, Jesus Christ?

SATURDAY: Mark 14:1-2

A plot is hatched. Why did the chief priests and scribes delay their plot to kill Jesus?

Reducing Microplastics in Your Drinking Water

Nano- and microplastics (NMPs) have become so pervasive in air, water and soil that they have made their way into the bodies and blood of humans and animals.

While many methods have been attempted to remove the tiny plastic particles, a new study has found that a simple solution for reducing their presence in drinking water may be to boil it, as when you make a cup of coffee or tea. In fact, filtering and boiling tap water containing calcium carbonate could help remove almost 90 percent of the plastics, a press release from the American Chemical Society (ACS) said.

The side effects of NMPs on humans are still being investigated, but recent studies indicate that their ingestion could impact the gut microbiome, the press release said. While some advanced water filtration systems are able to capture the plastic bits, less expensive strategies are necessary in order to help reduce their passive consumption on a larger scale.

In order to find out if boiling water could help effectively remove NMPs from soft and hard tap water, the research team collected hard water samples and "spiked them" with various amounts of NMPs. They boiled the water for five minutes, then allowed it to cool. When naturally mineral-rich hard water is boiled, it forms a chalky calcium carbonate substance known as limescale. The researchers then measured the remaining plastic content floating in the water.

The results indicated that crystalline structures — or "incrustants" — formed as the temperature of the water increased and encapsulated the NMPs. Eddy Zeng, one of the authors of the study, said the incrustants would build up over time as limescale usually does, and could then be scrubbed clean to remove the plastics. Zeng explained that any remaining incrustants could be removed by straining them through a coffee filter or other simple filter.

The experiments found that harder water produced a more pronounced encapsulation effect. For example, boiling a water sample with 300 milligrams of calcium carbonate in each liter removed as much as 90 percent of the free-floating NMPs. Roughly 25 percent were removed by boiling soft water containing less than 60 milligrams of calcium carbonate per liter. The researchers said the results indicated that boiling water could be an easy and effective way of reducing NMP ingestion. Full article **here**.

The days are surely coming, says the LORD, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah. Jeremiah 31:32

One of the distinct features of many United Church of Christ conferences, associations and congregations compared to other faith communities is their commitment to become Open and Affirming (O&A). O&A is a stance of radical welcome to LGBTQIA+ people. Because church communities have historically been places of hurt and exclusion, it is even more imperative that churches who are Open and Affirming take a strong and public stance.

A little over a year ago, the ONA Coalition welcomed a new executive director, The Rev. Katrina Roseboro-Marsh. According to a UCC news story that came out at the time,* She is the first Black woman to head the coalition. "I am honored and excited for this opportunity," she said. "I realize how important my selection is, and I recognize the magnitude of what this opportunity will mean for the LGBTQIA+ community. I accept this challenge because the coalition has laid the sturdy groundwork to make its next steps forward in reimaging and revisioning, with regeneration as a goal."

Roseboro-Marsh has more than 16 years of experience as a clinician. Her particular focus has been working with clients who identify as LGBTQIA+, as well as those who also identify as African American with an active religious and/or spiritual practice.

"We are excited to welcome Dr. Katrina to our team because of her unique voice, energy and experience," said search committee chair and Coalition Leadership Team member the Rev. Derek Terry. "With the current attack on queerness in schools and communities across the country, we feel an obligation to protect and ensure the rights of the LGBTQIA+ community.

Terry added that "while some work to erase the experiences of BIPOC people from the pages of history books," Roseboro-Marsh will "increase our advocacy work through an intentionally more intersectional approach."

Roseboro-Marsh is ordained clergy and holds ministerial standing with the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) and the Fellowship of Affirming Ministries. She is married to the Rev. Tana Roseboro-Marsh; they reside on the east coast with their Morkie, Xola Darling Roseboro-Marsh.
