Lenten Candles

Scripture John 20:1-18 | CEB – Common English Bible

Early in the morning of the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone had been taken away from the tomb. She ran to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one whom Jesus loved, and said, "They have taken the Lord from the tomb, and we don't know where they've put him." Peter and the other disciple left to go to the tomb. They were running together, but the other disciple ran faster than Peter and was the first to arrive at the tomb. Bending down to take a look, he saw the linen cloths lying there, but he didn't go in. Following him, Simon Peter entered the tomb and saw the linen cloths lying there. He also saw the face cloth that had been on Jesus' head. It wasn't with the other clothes but was folded up in its own place. Then the other disciple, the one who arrived at the tomb first, also went inside. He saw and believed.

They didn't yet understand the scripture that Jesus must rise from the dead. Then the disciples returned to the place where they were staying.

Mary stood outside near the tomb, crying. As she cried, she bent down to look into the tomb. She saw two angels dressed in white, seated where the body of Jesus had been, one at the head and one at the foot. The angels asked her, "Woman, why are you crying?"

She replied, "They have taken away my Lord, and I don't know where they've put him." As soon as she had said this, she turned around and saw Jesus standing there, but she didn't know it was Jesus.

Jesus said to her, "Mary."

She turned and said to him in Aramaic, "Rabbouni" (which means Teacher).

Sending the Word Home For your spiritual nourishment during the week.

LAST WEEK

Jesus leaves the public appearances behind and interacts with his inner circle in private, telling them about the end of the age (Mark 13:1-8, 24-37).

THIS WEEK

Jesus is tried and crucified. However, Jesus is victorious as he is risen from the dead three days later (Mark 15:16-39; 16:1-8).

THE POINT

We can celebrate Jesus, the crucified and risen king.

BIBLE NUTS & BOLTS

It is important to understand the original context of Scripture. It is also important to recognize how our own context influences our interpretation of Scripture. The books of the Bible were written in specific time periods in specific cultures. The biblical writers wrote for an audience that shared their knowledge of the culture and customs of the day. We live nearly 2,000 years after the most recent biblical text was written, so it is important to try to understand the Bible in its original context to better understand the message. By learning more about the people, places, and times of the writing, the meaning becomes more clear

STORY SUMMARY

Jesus rides into Jerusalem on a colt as people shout "Hosanna!" Later that week, Jesus is led out to be executed. He is crucified. mocked, cries out to God. drinks sour wine, and then dies. The temple curtain is torn, and a centurion says that Jesus was God's Son. Three days later, several women go to Jesus' tomb and discover the tomb is empty. A young man tells them that Jesus has been raised and that they should go tell his disciples to meet him in Galilee. They flee in terror.

PRACTICE: WORSHIP

How does the fact that Jesus rose from the dead impact your life? Worship God by expressing gratitude for that impact.

NEXT WEEK

Forty days after his resurrection, Jesus tells his disciples that they will receive the Holy Spirit and go out to the ends of the world to be witnesses. Jesus then ascends into heaven and the disciples return to Jerusalem. (Acts 1:1-14).

GOING DEEPER

As you hear and study these stories each week, consider what God has to say to you and your family. What is God's message to us? Consider the following basic pattern as a way of forming family devotions:

- Light a candle to help you focus this time as "God time." Pray a simple prayer together.
- Take a moment to check in with each other; what are each person's "highs" and "lows" today?
- Read aloud from the Daily Bible Readings from below. Discuss the questions following each.
- End with a blessing, by simply tracing a cross on each other's forehead. The Lord's Prayer is a good way to end your devotion time. If you used a candle, extinguish it as a sign of the end of the devotions.

Note: This is only a suggested pattern. It will vary with your household's context and patterns. What works best for you? First thing in the morning? Over breakfast? Bedtime? Be creative and flexible with how you practice and keep your devotions!

DAILY BIBLE READINGS

SUNDAY: Mark 16:1-8

Jesus' tomb is empty. What does the empty tomb reveal about God's power? What does the empty tomb reveal about Jesus?

MONDAY: John 20:1-10

Jesus is resurrected. What did the disciple believe about what he saw? What do you believe about what they saw?

TUESDAY: John 20:11-18

Jesus appears to Mary Magdaline. Why was Mary weeping? How was Mary able to recognize Jesus so easily?

WEDNESDAY: Luke 24:13-27

Jesus appears on the road to Emmaus. Why did those on the road to Emmaus not recognize Jesus?

THURSDAY: Luke 24:28-35

Jesus is known through broken bread. What happens in your heart when you sense God's presence?

FRIDAY: Luke 24:36-49

Jesus appears to his disciples. Pray and ask God to open your mind to understand the Scriptures.

SATURDAY: Matthew 28:16-20

Jesus commissions the disciples. How does knowing that Jesus is with you help you share the good news with others?

If you have wandered over recently you may be thinking "Why isn't this garden cleaned up for spring?". The garden is not neglected, it is providing cover and protection for our overwintering pollinators.

The insects that we worked hard to attract last year haven't yet awakened from their winter slumber. Some of our native bees lay their eggs in old plant stems and some butterflies and moths overwinter in chrysalids that are hiding under the dead leaves. If we clean up the garden too soon we will discard our pollinators with the dead leaves and garden debris.

So, when should we clean up the garden? The Xerxes Society for Invertebrate Conservation has put out some easy to remember guidelines that can help us remember when it is ok to clean up.

- · Have I put the away the snow shovel, mittens and winter coat?
- · Would I plant tomatoes now?
- · Is the lawn growing tall?
- Have I paid my taxes?
- · Are the apples and pears finished blooming?

When the guidelines above are met then it is time to work in the garden. Summer will be here soon enough and the memories of the untidy garden will be lost under the summer blooms.
