Scripture Acts 3:1-10 | New Revised Standard Version (NRSV)


One day Peter and John were going up to the temple at the hour of prayer, at three o'clock in the afternoon. And a man lame from birth was being carried in. People would lay him daily at the gate of the temple called the Beautiful Gate so that he could ask for alms from those entering the temple. When he saw Peter and John about to go into the temple, he asked them for alms.

Peter looked intently at him, as did John, and said, "Look at us." And he fixed his attention on them, expecting to receive something from them. But Peter said, "I have no silver or gold, but what I have I give you; in the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, stand up and walk." And he took him by the right hand and raised him up; and immediately his feet and ankles were made strong. Jumping up, he stood and began to walk, and he entered the temple with them, walking and leaping and praising God. All the people saw him walking and praising God, and they recognized him as the one who used to sit and ask for alms at the Beautiful Gate of the temple; and they were filled with wonder and amazement at what had happened to him.

Scripture Acts 3:1-10 | The Message (MSG)

One day at three o'clock in the afternoon, Peter and John were on their way into the Temple for prayer meeting. At the same time there was a man crippled from birth being carried up. Every day he was set down at the Temple gate, the one named Beautiful, to beg from those going into the Temple. When he saw Peter and John about to enter the Temple, he asked for a handout. Peter, with John at his side, looked him straight in the eye and said, "Look here." He looked up, expecting to get something from them.

Peter said, "I don't have a nickel to my name, but what I do have, I give you: In the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, walk!" He grabbed him by the right hand and pulled him up. In an instant his feet and ankles became firm. He jumped to his feet and walked.

The man went into the Temple with them, walking back and forth, dancing and praising God. Everybody there saw him walking around and praising God. They recognized him as the one who sat begging at the Temple's Gate Beautiful and rubbed their eyes, astonished, scarcely believing what they were seeing.



LAST WEEK

Forty days after his resurrection, Jesus tells his disciples that they will receive the Holy Spirit and go out to the ends of the world to be witnesses. Jesus then ascends into heaven and the disciples return to Jerusalem (Acts 1:1-14).

THIS WEEK

Peter and John prove to be the witnesses Jesus said they would become. In the name of Jesus, they heal a man who could not walk from birth (Acts 3:1-10).

THE POINT

What we do has the power to touch others with the love of God

BIBLE NUTS & BOLTS

The early church began on the first Pentecost. At that time, many disciples of Jesus were given the Holy Spirit and began preaching the good news about Jesus. The leaders of this early church in Jerusalem were the apostles and James, Jesus' brother, Believers were persecuted by both Roman and Jewish authorities. Paul was one of the persecutors until he converted to Christianity. Later, Paul went on three mission trips and spread the news of Jesus to the Gentiles—people who were not Jewish. This created issues in the church because some thought only Jews could become Christian. The first Council of Jerusalem decided that anybody could become Christian-Jew or Gentile.

STORY SUMMARY

For years, the faithful daily carried a man who could not walk and laid him by the Beautiful Gate of the temple. One day, this man asked Peter and John for alms. In Jesus' name, these two obedient Christ-followers, empowered by the Holy Spirit and the love of God, welcome this man and offer him a whole new way of life. They stop, honor his dignity, make eye contact, and reach out in the name of Jesus. They give the man far more than he anticipates. In the name of Jesus. Peter tells the man to rise and walk. Now the man can walk—and leap on his own into the temple to praise God.

PRACTICE: PRAYER

When we live in God's kingdom and want God to work through us, prayer is of the utmost importance. Pray a 1-2-3 prayer today. Ask God to:

- 1. Give you a willing heart.
- 2. Show you what God has for you to do this week
- 3. Work through you as you do God's will.

NEXT WEEK

Paul and Silas start the church in Thessalonica, where Paul preaches in Jesus' name (Acts 17:1-9; 1 Thessalonians 1:1-10).

GOING DEEPER

As you hear and study these stories each week, consider what God has to say to you and your family. What is God's message to us? Consider the following basic pattern as a way of forming family devotions:

- Light a candle to help you focus this time as "God time." Pray a simple prayer together.
- Take a moment to check in with each other; what are each person's "highs" and "lows" today?
- * Read aloud from the Daily Bible Readings from below. Discuss the questions following each.
- End with a blessing, by simply tracing a cross on each other's forehead. The Lord's Prayer is a good way to end your devotion time. If you used a candle, extinguish it as a sign of the end of the devotions.

Note: This is only a suggested pattern. It will vary with your household's context and patterns. What works best for you? First thing in the morning? Over breakfast? Bedtime? Be creative and flexible with how you practice and keep your devotions!

DAILY BIBLE READINGS

SUNDAY: Acts 3:1-10

Peter heals a man who cannot walk. Why is it important that we acknowledge the Christ when we do God's work?

MONDAY: Acts 3:11-16

Peter addresses the people. Which of Peter's descriptions of Jesus is most meaningful to you?

TUESDAY: Acts 16:1-10

Paul's mission heads west. Have you asked God for direction and experienced God's response? What happened?

WEDNESDAY: Acts 16:11-18

Paul and Silas encounter Lydia and a slave girl. What can you do to honor those who teach you about the Christ?

THURSDAY: Acts 16:19-24

Paul and Silas are arrested. How do you think you would respond to the threat of persecution or arrest for believing in or teaching about Jesus?

FRIDAY: Acts 16:25-34

While Paul and Silas pray in prison, there is an earthquake. What led to your belief in the Christ?

SATURDAY: Acts 16:35-40

Paul and Silas are released. Do you experience any freedom through your faith? How might others react if you shared your experience with them?

On November 30, 2023, The Soda Museum and Main Street Arcade opened and is devoted to more than 100 years of soft drink history and marketing and offers a selection of drinks — in glass bottles, naturally — of brands both forgotten and obscure: Moxie, Teem, Bubble Up, Brownie Root Beer, Kickapoo Joy Juice. Each bottle of Mr. Cola proclaims it is "the aristocrat of colas."

Enjoy reminiscing about when Coke only came in a glass bottle or perhaps the advent of the first soda vending machine? A new museum in St. Charles will quench the thirst of soda enthusiasts with an immersive journey through the history of these carbonated beverages.

The museum will be split into two sections. April Alzheimer's News

The Alzheimer's Association Announces New "Dementia Care Navigation Roundtable" (DCNR)" The DCNR convened experts from across the healthcare industry to share best practices and disseminate resources. The goal is to help people living with dementia achieve improved outcomes, reduce hospital stays and emergency room visits, shorten delays in long-term care placement, as well as address the needs of caregivers. The DCNR will develop strategies and solutions that would allow these benefits to be implemented in more communities across the country. Guiding principles have been published in the journal "Alzheimer's & Dementia:" Translational Research & Clinical Interventions (TRCI). The new paper provided the cornerstone of the DCNR's work to create a national framework for dementia care navigation. For more information on care and support services, visit alz.org/Help-Support.

PUCC provides offering envelopes on Sunday mornings at the table where the bulletins are for families to take for their children to put a tiny offering in; a dollar or even just a few coins. This money will go towards our fund for Heifer International that will be used to help give an animal to families in need! The kids are able to then give their envelope to an usher on their way down to Sunday School, or Gabriel can collect it during their Opening Session he does with them all as well.

Once we've collected enough money for an animal, we'll see if the kids would like to have it go towards that animal or wait to donate a bigger one. And for any animal we donate to from the kids' offerings, PUCC will match that, living into what I will call our Noah's Ark. Two by two we help the world!

Safety at Church

With the unfortunate rise of violence towards some churches in the news, a PUCC Council member formed a team to establish security precautions for Parkway UCC. This group started by working with vendors and a consultant. There is a federal grant program to fund security at church facilities. However, these grant programs are highly competitive, and the team learned that, if awarded, receiving the funds could take three to four years. While the team applies for a grant, our Council agreed to a plan to start with core capabilities now that can be expanded if grant funds are received and/or the Council deems appropriate. The first steps to establish security precautions have been taken.

The team focused first on protecting the Sunday morning experience. The approach is to install precautions, learn how to use them, then develop procedures and training to increase effectiveness. There are six steps. Here is what has been installed so far:

• Call 911 Buttons.

Alerting first responders is crucial. Emergency buttons are more effective than calling 911 from a phone. Three permanently mounted 911 call buttons have been installed and activated. Portable call buttons may also be utilized on Sunday mornings and for groups that use the facilities and want this capability.

Security Cameras.

While it would require many cameras to secure the entire facility, three cameras that cover the pathways through the Gathering Space to get to the sanctuary have been installed. These views can be monitored on Sunday mornings. More cameras can be added as a need is established and funds are available.

• Front Door Keypad.

The front door code is widely known and, therefore, less effective for security. A new front door code system has been installed that can provide unique entry codes to individuals and groups. The current push-button unlocking mechanism will continue to be in service until the procedures for the new system are developed.

• First Aid.

Triage for those wounded during an incident must be received as soon as possible. In a violent situation, medical first responders are not allowed into the building until the police have cleared the building of any danger. Therefore, people in the building who are not wounded must give aid to those in need. "Stop The Bleed" emergency kits have been purchased. Training for using these kits, and first aid training in general is needed.

There are two other steps that are in progress:

• Public Address System.

PA system is necessary to provide an emergency alert to the people in the nursery, the Heritage Room, and the youth rooms on the lower level. This will be accomplished using the current phone system.

Secure Doors.

Appropriate doors for the Nursery, the Heritage Room, and the rooms in use on the lower level must be capable of being locked from inside the rooms, and each room needs an escape route. Other doors into the facility should be locked during the Sunday morning worship service.

The team will continue to focus on establishing security precautions and effectiveness.

We are looking for volunteers to join our team as we consider utilizing formal training sessions to develop comprehensive safety procedures. If you are interested in participating in this endeavor, please contact Council member Lisa Davidson
