

Scripture 1 Corinthians 1:10-17 | MSG - The Message

I have a serious concern to bring up with you, my friends, using the authority of Jesus, our Master. I'll put it as urgently as I can: You *must* get along with each other. You must learn to be considerate of one another, cultivating a life in common.

I bring this up because some from Chloe's family brought a most disturbing report to my attention—that you're fighting among yourselves! I'll tell you exactly what I was told: You're all picking sides, going around saying, "I'm on Paul's side," or "I'm for Apollos," or "Peter is my man," or "I'm in the Messiah group."

I ask you, "Has the Messiah been chopped up in little pieces so we can each have a relic all our own? Was Paul crucified for you? Was a single one of you baptized in Paul's name?" I was not involved with any of your baptisms except for Crispus and Gaius—and on getting this report, I'm sure glad I wasn't. At least no one can go around saying he was baptized in my name. (Come to think of it, I also baptized Stephanas's family, but as far as I can recall, that's it.)

God didn't send me out to collect a following for myself, but to preach the Message of what God has done, collecting a following for God.

New Testament Lessons

Acts 18:1-4 | NRSV - New Revised Standard Version

After this Paul left Athens and went to Corinth. There he found a Jew named Aquila, a native of Pontus, who had recently come from Italy with his wife Priscilla, because Claudius had ordered all Jews to leave Rome. Paul went to see them, and, because he was of the same trade, he stayed with them, and they worked together—by trade they were tentmakers. Every sabbath he would argue in the synagogue and would try to convince Jews and Greeks.

1 Corinthians 1:10-18 | NRSV

Now I appeal to you, brothers and sisters, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that all of you be in agreement and that there be no divisions among you, but that you be united in the same mind and the same purpose. For it has been reported to me by Chloe's people that there are quarrels among you, my brothers and sisters. What I mean is that each of you says, "I belong to Paul," or "I belong to Apollos," or "I belong to Cephas," or "I belong to Christ." Has Christ been divided? Was Paul crucified for you? Or were you baptized in the name of Paul?


I thank God that I baptized none of you except Crispus and Gaius, so that no one can say that you were baptized in my name. (I did baptize also the household of Stephanas; beyond that, I do not know whether I baptized anyone else.)

For Christ did not send me to baptize but to proclaim the gospel, and not with eloquent wisdom, so that the cross of Christ might not be emptied of its power. For the message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God.





LAST WEEK

Paul and Silas start the church in Thessalonica, where Paul preaches in Jesus' name (Acts 17:1-9; 1 Thessalonians 1:1-10).

THIS WEEK

Paul reaches out to the church in Corinth with a message of unity (Acts 18:1-4; 1 Corinthians 1:10-18).

THE POINT

We are united together by the power of God in Jesus Christ.

BIBLE NUTS & BOLTS

There are many resources to help us understand the Bible. A concordance is a resource where we can look up a word and see where it appears in the Bible. Maps and timelines can help us visualize how different places and events relate to each other. Bible dictionaries can help define words as they are used in Scripture. Bible encyclopedias provide short entries on relevant topics, and commentaries describe the historical, political, and social context of Bible passages.

PRACTICE: PRAYER

One of the last things that Jesus did on the night before he died was pray for the unity of his people. Sit quietly and read this prayer of Jesus found in John 17. After you have read this prayer, spend some time meditating on the words. Write or draw your own prayerful response to Jesus' prayer for all of us.

STORY SUMMARY

By the time Paul gets to Corinth, he is worn out. God speaks to Paul in a vision, telling him not to be afraid and assures him that no one will harm him when he speaks God's word, for God has many people in Corinth. In spite of challenges, Paul's boldness and trust in speaking the word in Corinth bear fruit. He stays in Corinth for eighteen months, settles down, and lives with a married couple named Aquila and Priscilla. Eventually conflict arises in the synagogue as groups align themselves with various leaders rather than with Christ.

NEXT WEEK

Paul describes perfect and self-giving love (1 Corinthians 13:1-13).

GOING DEEPER

As you hear and study these stories each week, consider what God has to say to you and your family. What is God's message to us? Consider the following basic pattern as a way of forming family devotions:

- Light a candle to help you focus this time as "God time." Pray a simple prayer together.
- Take a moment to check in with each other; what are each person's "highs" and "lows" today?
- Read aloud from the Daily Bible Readings from below. Discuss the questions following each.
- End with a blessing, by simply tracing a cross on each other's forehead. The Lord's Prayer is a good way to end your devotion time. If you used a candle, extinguish it as a sign of the end of the devotions.

Note: This is only a suggested pattern. It will vary with your household's context and patterns. What works best for you? First thing in the morning? Over breakfast? Bedtime? Be creative and flexible with how you practice and keep your devotions!

DAILY BIBLE READINGS

SUNDAY: Acts 18:1-4

Paul visits the church at Corinth. Who do you have something in common with? Does that make it easier to share the faith with them?

MONDAY: 1 Corinthians 1:10-18

Paul makes an appeal for unity. What do you hear people quarrel about? Why is quarrelling among believers counterproductive to the faith?

TUESDAY: Acts 18:5-11

Paul proclaims the word in Macedonia. What are your thoughts about the way Paul responded to those who rejected the gospel?

WEDNESDAY: Acts 18:12-17

Paul is dragged before Gallio. Where are you most afraid to speak up about Jesus?

THURSDAY: Acts 18:18-23

Paul leaves Corinth and returns to Antioch. What can you do to help spread the gospel to places beyond your community?

FRIDAY: 1 Corinthians 1:19-31

God is the source of life. What does it mean that "the foolishness of God is wiser than men"? How will you boast of the Lord today?

SATURDAY: 1 Corinthians 11:17-26

Teaching about the Lord's Supper. What do we proclaim when we partake in the Lord's Supper?
