

Scripture John 6:1-14 | NRSV - New Revised Standard Version After this Jesus went to the other side of the Sea of Galilee, also called the Sea of Tiberias. A large crowd kept following him, because they saw the signs that he was doing for the sick. Jesus went up the mountain and sat down there with his disciples. Now the Passover, the festival of the Jews, was near. When he looked up and saw a large crowd coming toward him, Jesus said to Philip, "Where are we to buy bread for these people to eat?" He said this to test him, for he himself knew what he was going to do. Philip answered him, "Six months' wages would not buy enough bread for each of them to get a little." One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said to him, "There is a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish. But what are they among so many people?" Jesus said, "Make the people sit down." Now there was a great deal of grass in the place; so they sat down, about five thousand in all. Then Jesus took the loaves, and when he had given thanks, he distributed them to those who were seated; so also the fish, as much as they wanted. When they were satisfied, he told his disciples, "Gather up the fragments left over, so that nothing may be lost." So they gathered them up, and from the fragments of the five barley loaves, left by those who had eaten. they filled twelve baskets. When the people saw the sign that he had done. they began to say, "This is indeed the prophet who is to come into the world."



Sending the Word Home For your spiritual nourishment during the week.

LAST WEEK

Paul reaches out to the church in Corinth with a message of unity (Acts 18:1-4; 1 Corinthians 1:10-18).

THIS WEEK

Paul describes perfect and self-giving love (1 Corinthians 13:1-13).

THE POINT

God's love is the greatest gift we can receive and share.

BIBLE NUTS & BOLTS

The Epistles—Letters—are a collection of twenty-one books in the New Testament. The first thirteen epistles were written by Paul or one of his associates. Many of the epistles were letters written to churches to help solve problems or to encourage them in their ministry. Most of the New Testament letters are what are called "occasional" letters. Letters are called occasional when they address specific situations or occasions.

PRACTICE: FELLOWSHIP

We practice fellowship when we build and strengthen loving relationships with others in the Body of Christ. This week, write someone an encouraging message.

STORY SUMMARY

In Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians, he does more than tell people to love one another. He invites them to be in a special community with one another through the Church. Paul tells the Corinthians we are one Body of Christ and we should love God and other people equally, no matter who they are. He says that the greatest of the gifts God has given us is loveand we must share that love with everyone we meet. Paul challenges the Corinthians to look beyond the differences and divisions in their church. He invites them to genuinely love God and their community, as we are also called to do.

NEXT WEEK

Paul focuses his teaching on clarifying the concept of resurrection, stating that it is not just a matter of raising from the dead but of new life in God's kingdom (1 Corinthians 15:1-26, 51-57).

GOING DEEPER

As you hear and study these stories each week, consider what God has to say to you and your family. What is God's message to us? Consider the following basic pattern as a way of forming family devotions:

- Light a candle to help you focus this time as "God time." Pray a simple prayer together.
- Take a moment to check in with each other; what are each person's "highs" and "lows" today?
- Read aloud from the Daily Bible Readings from below. Discuss the questions following each.
- End with a blessing, by simply tracing a cross on each other's forehead. The Lord's Prayer is a good way to end your devotion time. If you used a candle, extinguish it as a sign of the end of the devotions.

Note: This is only a suggested pattern. It will vary with your household's context and patterns. What works best for you? First thing in the morning? Over breakfast? Bedtime? Be creative and flexible with how you practice and keep your devotions!

SUNDAY: 1 Corinthians 13:1-13

Paul writes about love. What is the hardest part about loving the way Paul describes? When have you received this kind of love?

MONDAY: 1 Corinthians 14:26-33

Paul builds up the Body of Christ. Describe confusion. Describe peace.

TUESDAY: 1 Corinthians 15:1-11

Paul proclaims the resurrection. What does Paul say about the grace of God?

WEDNESDAY: 1 Corinthians 15:12-19

The significance of Christ's resurrection. What would Christianity be if Jesus had not been raised from the dead?

THURSDAY: 1 Corinthians 15:20-26

Christ is God's first fruits. What does it look like to you to be alive in Christ? How does one belong to Christ?

FRIDAY: 1 Corinthians 15:30-41

There are heavenly bodies and earthly bodies. How does what you do on earth affect the kingdom of God?

SATURDAY: 1 Corinthians 15:42-50

There are physical and spiritual bodies. Describe your physical body and its abilities. Describe the condition of your spirit.
