

Scripture Psalm 139: 1-18, 23-24 | NRSV—New Revised Standard Version O Lord, you have searched me and known me. You know when I sit down and when I rise up; you discern my thoughts from far away. You search out my path and my lying down, and are acquainted with all my ways. Even before a word is on my tongue, O Lord, you know it completely. You hem me in, behind and before, and lay your hand upon me. Such knowledge is too wonderful for me; it is so high that I cannot attain it. Where can I go from your spirit? Or where can I flee from your presence? If I ascend to heaven, you are there; if I make my bed in Sheol, you are there. If I take the wings of the morning and settle at the farthest limits of the sea, even there your hand shall lead me, and your right hand shall hold me fast. If I say, "Surely the darkness shall cover me, and the light around me become night," even the darkness is

not dark to you; the night is as bright as the day, for darkness is as light to you. For it was you who formed my inward parts; you knit me together in my mother's womb. 

Summer Bible Study: Ecclesiastes – June 23

Sundays, starting June 23 | 9-9:30am | Heritage Room

Sometimes considered the most curmudgeonly and cynical of all the books of the Bible, Ecclesiastes is also praised for telling it like it is. It addresses eternal problems that have always troubled human society: the problem of pain, the fruitlessness of overwork, the vanity of ambition, the age of anxiety, the fear of death and being forgotten. Ecclesiastes reminds us that these are not 21st century problems.

This book of wisdom also reminds us that the great joys in life are fairly simple: snuggling under the covers, having close friends and/or a sweetheart, sunlight, rest, eating good food and drinking good wine, and a good days' work. It offers soothing certainty about what it means to enjoy the good life: waiting, expecting, with open arms, to receive day by day the good things that come from God.

This study is divided into four sections:

- Chapters 1-2 (Vapor of Vapors: Everything Evaporates)
- Chapters 3:1-4:8 (A Time for Everything)
- Chapters 4:9-6:12 (The Key to Life is in Low Expectations)
- Chapters 7-12 (Time and Chance Happen to All)

In these Bible studies, you will be encouraged to listen: listen to the Bible, listen to your own questions and responses, and listen to the honest sharing among participants in your study group. In that mix of biblical text, personal engagement, and honest speaking and listening, God's word may be heard, speaking challenge and comfort. Report of Sanctuary Symbols Discussion

On Sunday, February 25, the Church Council arranged for a Biblical and Theological conversation with Eden Seminary professor Rev. Clint McCann after worship in our sanctuary, on the subject of symbols in our sanctuary. This topic is relevant today because it is 25 years since we began using the new sanctuary, making this a good time to reexamine the sanctuary and how it is decorated. This includes reconsideration of placement of the US flag, a secular symbol, in the sanctuary.

Rev. McCann began at the beginning with the book of Genesis and walked us through the way that the Hebrew Bible (Old Testament) could have started with the story of Abraham and Sarah or the story of Moses and the Hebrew people, but instead it started with creation... the worldwide human family is more important than any specific people... the people of God in the midst of all of God's people.

Rev. McCann mentioned his favorite holy day after Easter and Christmas --World Communion Sunday because we need to have everyone at the table in order to be who God intends us to be.

Our attention needs to be on hospitality, welcome, inclusivity, expansiveness. Our sanctuaries need to be sacred spaces that embrace the stranger from all walks of life. The acknowledgement of our geographical location as a community within a community obligates us to see our place within the world. *Our mission is from everywhere to everywhere*.

Scripture tells Abram and Sarai - and all of us - that we will not only be blessed but that we will also be a blessing to all the families of the earth. Isaiah 2:2-4 reminds us that God will establish justice among all the nations and we shall live together in peace -- as we all learn to beat our swords into ploughshares and our spears into pruning-hooks.

Psalm 82, a prophetic psalm, defines God's commitment to justice in the form of serving the poor, needy, hungry... and ends with saying "Arise, O God, establish justice on earth for all the nations belong to you."

All of this means that we need to acknowledge the fact that some people are uncomfortable with the US flag in our sanctuary. Contrary to what some Christian

Nationalists might claim the will of God and the policies of the US are not in perfect alignment. Separation of church and state is important. The plurality of traditions is to be celebrated.

In the Book of Romans, Paul quotes Psalm 117 when he talks about God blessing all the nations. Paul is the one who helped widen the welcome of the church when he proclaimed that people didn't have to be Jewish to belong. He helped take away some of the sacred requirements, the badges of Jewish identity, ie. circumcision, dietary rule and Sabbath worship, so the people of the world would be welcome and would belong.

During and following Rev. McCann's remarks, several members made statements or suggestions or asked questions. The suggestions included, among other things, using the flag in the sanctuary on Memorial Day, Independence Day and Veterans Day; relocating the flag elsewhere in the building; and keeping things the way they are because of the controversial nature of actions taken with respect to the flag.

With respect to the flag, Council is considering relocating the US flag to another location in the church, such as the History Tower in the Gathering Space (a place which would tie our national identity and its symbol to our founders, the German immigrant farmers who came to America, and whose activities were shaped by their involvement in the American dream).

Council continues to welcome information, suggestions, and ideas on this subject, as it continues to carefully deliberate on it. We welcome members and friends to discuss this with any Council officer or member, or to send written comments to the Council.

"The realm of the heavens is like a mustard seed that a person took and sowed in their field." – Matthew 13:31 (Gafney, **Year A**)

A famous civil rights leader once told me: One of the best kept secrets of the 60s is that your mom's greens fueled the movement.

I might've received this as a compliment, but, initially, I was insulted. Because mom – Karen Spellman – is a brilliant strategist and tactician. She thinks of details and possibilities and how to engineer solutions to them like no one else can. She doesn't miss a beat. I am confident that had way more influence than her greens.

Despite this, I do recall that whenever her fellow-movement folks in DC would meet at our house (which was several times a year), she would make her famous greens. And because I loved them, too, I loved those meetings – the food made them special.

Mom's greens, made with collards, kale, and mustards, all grow from the tiniest of seeds.

Look for the seeds, beloved. Look for the tiniest thing that God is implanting within you. Like the formation of a thought or idea that gives you some excitement or hope. Like the kindling of some warmth in a relationship that you realize might have more to it than you realize. Like finding that question you want to delve even deeper into. Like feeling the nudge to get to church, to pray a bit more.

Those are your seeds. Being planted by the Creator. Ready to be sown. And when they're sown? That's God handing us love on every plate. Just ask my mom.

The Lord will keep your going out and your coming in from this time on and forevermore. – Psalm 121:8 (NRSV)
