
Meditation Jonah's opposition to God's grace is not unusual. Jonah's response anticipates the older brother in the Parable of the Prodigal Son; anticipates the workers hired first in the Parable of the Workers in the Vineyard; and it anticipates those of us who find it extremely difficult to follow Jesus' eminently clear and straightforward admonition to "love your enemies". The Book of Jonah ends with a question that Jonah does not answer, and this open-ended conclusion effectively suggests that the question is now ours to answer. Will we do any better than Jonah when it comes to resisting the pervasive and persistent temptation to restrict the scope of God's concern to us and to our kind of people? ~ Clint McCann

LAST WEEK

This is the beginning of the year; however, our Bible reading for today starts in the second chapter of Genesis. Genesis 1 is a beautiful description of creation that emphasizes God making all things *good!*

THIS WEEK

At the beginning of creation God makes a promise to the first humans, but they quickly break the promise they make to God (Genesis 2:4b-7, 15-17, 3:1-8).

THE POINT

God loves us, even when we do the wrong thing.

BIBLE NUTS & BOLTS

The Hebrew Bible—the Old Testament—was written over a period of several hundred years by different authors. According to tradition, Moses wrote the first five books, including Genesis. However, scholars believe that these books were gathered from earlier stories during a difficult time for the Jewish people, around 600 BCE.

PRACTICE: PRAYER

One of the last things that Jesus did on the night before he died was pray for the unity of his people. Sit quietly and read this prayer of Jesus found in John 17. After you have read this prayer, spend some time meditating on the words. Write or draw your own prayerful response to Jesus' prayer for all of us.

STORY SUMMARY

After God made the earth, God formed the first humans. These humans. Adam and Eve, were called by God to care for the garden of Eden. God gave them permission to eat any of the fruit that grew there, with one exception. The crafty serpent encouraged Eve to question God's rules and love for humankind. She decided that God was keeping the best from them rather than giving them the best of creation. Both humans ate the forbidden fruit. God had given them everything, including a perfect relationship with God, but they followed the words of the serpent and disobeved God. Their betrayal damaged their relationship with God. Sin and brokenness came between humankind and God.

NEXT WEEK

God promises Abram (Abraham), that he and his wife Sarai (Sarah) will have many descendants, even though they are old and have no children (Genesis 15:1-6).

GOING DEEPER

As you hear and study these stories each week, consider what God has to say to you and your family. What is God's message to us? Consider the following basic pattern as a way of forming family devotions:

- ❖ Light a candle to help you focus this time as "God time." Pray a simple prayer together.
- Take a moment to check in with each other; what are each person's "highs" and "lows" today?
- * Read aloud from the Daily Bible Readings from below. Discuss the questions following each.
- End with a blessing, by simply tracing a cross on each other's forehead. The Lord's Prayer is a good way to end your devotion time. If you used a candle, extinguish it as a sign of the end of the devotions.

Note: This is only a suggested pattern. It will vary with your household's context and patterns. What works best for you? First thing in the morning? Over breakfast? Bedtime? Be creative and flexible with how you practice and keep your devotions!

DAILY BIBLE READINGS

SUNDAY: Genesis 2:4b-7, 15-17; 3:1-8

The first humans disobey the rule God gave them. What does it feel like when you know you are doing something you should not do?

MONDAY: Genesis 3:9-19

God declares the consequences of Adam and Eve's disobedience. What relationships were affected as a result of their disobedience?

TUESDAY: Genesis 6:9-22

God makes a covenant with Noah and gives him directions for building the ark. Why did God decide to send a flood? And why did God choose Noah to build the ark?

WEDNESDAY: Genesis 7:17-24; 8:6-12

The floods come. How do you think Noah and his family felt as the days went by during the flood?

THURSDAY: Genesis 9:8-17

God establishes a covenant and provides a sign of that covenant. Why do you think God provided such a clear and recurring sign of the covenant?

FRIDAY: Genesis 11:1-9

The people try to build a tower to reach the heavens. Why does God respond in the way God does to the building of the tower of Babel?

SATURDAY: Genesis 12:1-7

God calls Abram. What do God ask Abram to do in these verses, and what does God promise him? What was Abram's response?

He is also active in several international organizations and believes in practicing what he teaches. In his personal time, he enjoys sports and is a Teaching Elder in the Presbyterian Church. This book follows the fascinating true story of Lady Tan from childhood through adulthood as she navigates becoming a woman, and one of the first female doctors during 15th century China. The historical perspective of the book includes arranged marriages, foot binding, the justice system, and the roles of male physician and female midwife. In 1511, when Lady Tan turned fifty, she published a book of her medical cases. Interestingly, all of her cases were women and girls. Many of her remedies are still used in traditional Chinese medicine today. The author believes that Lady Tan was remarkable in her time period, and would be remarkable if she lived today.

Join the Movement! In what feels like an increasingly divisive world, we feel the pull toward practicing neighborliness — getting to know the people on our street, in our community, and in our organizations more deeply. So, we are promoting a People's Supper campaign during the height of election season to help remind each other what community is really about: relationship not about politics. The People's Supper uses shared meals to build trust and connection among people of different identities and perspectives. This work was born of a belief — to quote a popular adage — that "change moves at the speed of trust," and that trust moves at the speed of relationships.

It starts with an invitation. Hosts will reach out to people in their communities they don't yet know to invite them to a small dinner of 6-8 people in their home, at a local restaurant, or a neutral location like a church or community center. Some of these folks might be people hosts know a little, but not deeply. Others might be people they don't know at all. And still others might be neighbors who hold different beliefs.

Dinner is served. Dinner is simple. Maybe everyone clips in for a pizza, or you pick some things from your summer garden to serve. Dinner (or brunch or lunch) is the mechanism of the relationship, not the point, so go simple.

Relationships are built. Each host will have access to a toolkit that involves a script with an introduction, ice-breaker questions, ground rules, and 3-4 discussion questions. The toolkit will also give hosts some tips for how to redirect conversation away from politics (if it comes up).

What happens after? After all of the dinners, hosts will be invited to debrief the experience and see if there are any natural next steps that arise.

Cheering for one another - *Life Is a Marathon* Molly Baskette

I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith. Now there is in store for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous Judge, will award to me on that day—and not only to me, but also to all who have longed for his appearing. - 2 Timothy 4:7-8 (NIV)

All right all right Paul, we get it with all your braggadocious "I" statements above. Jesus loves you better; you're gonna get the first-place ribbon while the rest of us can only hope for a participation trophy.

But what's that there in the last line? Is that an "all" I spy? Like, somehow even us third-rate Jesus people can take turns wearing the crown? It's almost like you recognize that whatever race you have finished, you didn't do it alone

My goddaughter just ran the New York Marathon last fall, her first. She wasn't fast enough to be a regular entrant, so she qualified by raising funds for a NYC antipoverty agency.

She said mile 19 was the hardest, when there was still so far to go and her friends and family up ahead weren't yet in view. That's when she started running closer to the curb and the cheering watchers. She'd written her name on her arm in Sharpie, and people called out, "Go Ruby Go! You're doing great!"

She was encouraged by the signs people held up: "Remember Your Why," "Blink if you peed a little," and a giant avatar of Taylor Swift cooing "In your marathon era!" Mile after mile, they kept her going. A 6-year-old girl ran out of the crowd, took her hand, and jogged along with her for a second, shouting, "Don't give up! You look beautiful!"

What would the world look like, she wondered aloud, if we cheered for one another like that every single day?

Queen, until your appearing, may we cheer and be cheered during the most challenging stretches of this marathon of living. Amen.

Be Opened

16th Sunday after Pentecost

Mark 7:24-37

Can you imagine your life being changed for the better with just a gentle touch, a loving word or even a compassionate smile?

The people we encounter in Mark's Gospel can. Their stories, packed into what is the shortest of the four gospels, tell of how the Son of God brings healing and hope to all he meets.

Rich, poor, men, women, children, sinners, outcasts — it doesn't matter who you are. There's nothing Jesus can't do to turn our lives around. But for that to happen, we must ask: Are we opened to the Divine impossible possibilities?

Mark brings us today a perfect illustration of new life in the healing of the deaf and mute man.

In the story, Jesus starts by placing his fingers in the deaf man's ears. Jesus is acknowledging nonverbally his understanding of what the problem is. It's a loving act that puts the man at ease.

He then spits on his fingers and touches the deaf man's tongue. Yes, a cringy moment for our modern sensibilities, but spit was believed to have healing qualities in ancient times.

The final step in this healing comes with Jesus' sigh, "Ephphatha!" — which is Aramaic for "be opened."

And with that, a man whose life was closed from the community because of his disability, opens to belonging and acceptance.

The word "Ephphatha" only appears eight times in the New Testament, almost always with stories of healing. It is a word, though, that we should add to our spiritual vocabularies, as the reminder to "be opened" is an important one in the healing of whatever needs to be healed in our lives.

Too often doubt and cynicism take over our lives, closing us off to the that healing of body, mind and spirit. Yet Jesus sees our situations and sighs, "Be opened!" For what has being closed to God's possibilities done for us?

In the Catholic tradition there is an optional baptismal rite that parents can request as part of the sacrament where the priest says a prayer as he touches the infant's ears and then mouth. The prayer is for the child to hear God's voice and to speak of God's grace as they grow. As you might have already guessed, it is known as the Ephphatha Rite.

Take a moment this day to touch your ears and then your mouth, praying to hear the Divine speaking to you and for the grace to speak words of love.

Caring Healer, may today we "be opened" to the many ways you are renewing, reviving and restoring us. May we hear Your Son's loving word spoken to us now and always, "Ephphatha!" Amen.
