



Gospei Lesson Luke 5:1-11 | NRSV

Once while Jesus was standing beside the lake of Gennesaret, and the crowd was pressing in on him to hear the word of God, he saw two boats there at the shore of the lake; the fishermen had gone out of them and were washing their nets. He got into one of the boats, the one belonging to Simon, and asked him to put out a little way from the shore. Then he sat down and taught the crowds from the boat. When he had finished speaking, he said to Simon, "Put out into the deep water and let down your nets for a catch." Simon answered, "Master, we have worked all night long but have caught nothing. Yet if you say so, I will let down the nets." When they had done this, they caught so many fish that their nets were beginning to break. So, they signaled their partners in the other boat to come and help them. And they came and filled both boats, so that they began to sink. New Testament Lesson Acts 2:1-18 | NRSV

When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability.

Now there were devout Jews from every nation under heaven living in Jerusalem. And at this sound the crowd gathered and was bewildered, because each one heard them speaking in the native language of each. Amazed and astonished, they asked, "Are not all these who are speaking Galileans? And how is it that we hear, each of us, in our own native language? All were amazed and perplexed, saying to one another, "What does this mean?" But others sneered and said, "They are filled with new wine."

But Peter, standing with the eleven, raised his voice and addressed them, "Men of Judea and all who live in Jerusalem, let this be known to you, and listen to what I say. Indeed, these are not drunk, as you suppose, for it is only nine o'clock in the morning. No, this is what was spoken through the prophet Joel:

'In the last days it will be, God declares, that I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh, and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, and your young men shall see visions, and your old men shall dream dreams. Even upon my slaves, both men and women, in those days I will pour out my Spirit; and they shall prophesy.'



LAST WEEK

At the beginning of creation God makes a promise to the first humans, but they quickly break the promise they make to God (Genesis 2:4b-7, 15-17, 3:1-8).

THIS WEEK

God promises Abram (Abraham), that he and his wife Sarai (Sarah) will have many descendants, even though they are old and have no children (Genesis 15:1-6).

THE POINT

God cares for us as communities, families, and individuals.

BIBLE NUTS & BOLTS

Origin stories are stories that explain the beginning of something. Genesis as a whole is a series of origin stories. It starts with the beginning of the universe and then moves to the origin of the people of Israel. God's promise to make of Abram a "great nation" is considered to be the origin of the Israelites with Abram and Sarai (Abraham and Sarah) as their First Parents. In Scripture, these stories often comment on how God is interacting with the world and provide the Israelite people with a clear cultural and historical identity.

PRACTICE: Fellowship

God's call to Abram is a call for Abram to walk deeper in faith and trust with God, increasing his fellowship with God. This week, take a walk and consider your own relationship with God. Invite family members to join you on this walk. You could even make it a family walk at nighttime under the stars.

STORY SUMMARY

God calls a man named Abram (later Abraham) and his wife Sarai (later Sarah) to take a very special place in God's redemptive plans for all people. God promises to bless Abram and Sarai and give them descendants who will be blessings to others. This promise makes Abram bold enough to confess his doubts to God. He reminds God that he does not vet have any descendants. God points to the night sky and makes him an astonishing promise: that his offspring will be as numerous as the stars in the heavens. It is an amazing promise, one that would no doubt be difficult to believe, but Abram does. He trusts God and in God's ability to carry out that promise. God, in turn, counts

NEXT WEEK

Despite many difficulties, God keeps Abram's great grandson Joseph safe and keeps the promise God made to Abram, too. (Genesis 37:3-8, 17b-22, 26-34; 50:15-20).

GOING DEEPER

As you hear and study these stories each week, consider what God has to say to you and your family. What is God's message to us? Consider the following basic pattern as a way of forming family devotions:

- Light a candle to help you focus this time as "God time." Pray a simple prayer together.
- Take a moment to check in with each other; what are each person's "highs" and "lows" today?
- * Read aloud from the Daily Bible Readings from below. Discuss the questions following each.
- End with a blessing, by simply tracing a cross on each other's forehead. The Lord's Prayer is a good way to end your devotion time. If you used a candle, extinguish it as a sign of the end of the devotions.

Note: This is only a suggested pattern. It will vary with your household's context and patterns. What works best for you? First thing in the morning? Over breakfast? Bedtime? Be creative and flexible with how you practice and keep your devotions!

DAILY BIBLE READINGS

SUNDAY: Genesis 15:1-6

God makes an outrageous promise to Abram. Have you ever been promised something that you did not believe could happen? Did it? How did that make you feel?

MONDAY: Genesis 17:1-8

God repeats the promise to Abram and gives him a new name. Why do you think God changed Abram's name to Abraham?

TUESDAY: Genesis 18:1-15

Three guests visit Abraham and Sarah in their old age and promise them that Sarah will have a son. Why do you think Sarah laughed when she heard their news?

WEDNESDAY: Genesis 21:1-7

Sarah bears a son named Isaac. How do you think Sarah's laughter changes from yesterday's story to this one?

THURSDAY: Genesis 22:1-14

God asks Abraham to sacrifice his son. Why do you think God asks Abraham to do something hard and unthinkable?

FRIDAY: Genesis 27:1-17, 30-38

Jacob steals his brother Esau's blessing. Isaac had only one blessing to give. How are God's blessings different?

SATURDAY: Genesis 35:9-15

God appears to Jacob, changes his name, and gives him a blessing. Why do you think God changes Jacob's name? What is included in the blessing God gives Jacob?

The historical novel is inspired by the true story of a woman physician in 15th - 16th century China, the Ming Dynasty. It includes themes of gender roles, friendship, family hierarchies, and support systems. On September 17th we'll discuss the middle third of the book, up to the chapter called The Great Within.

This book follows the fascinating true story of Lady Tan from childhood through adulthood as she navigates becoming a woman, and one of the first female doctors during 15th century China. The historical perspective of the book includes arranged marriages, foot binding, the justice system, and the roles of male physician and female midwife. In 1511, when Lady Tan turned fifty, she published a book of her medical cases. Interestingly, all of her cases were women and girls. Many of her remedies are still used in traditional Chinese medicine today. The author believes that Lady Tan was remarkable in her time period, and would be remarkable if she lived today.

"Genealogy 101: Have you ever wanted to be a historical detective? Or learn how to begin researching your family's history? Carol French-Cobb

Are you curious about how to learn more about Genealogy? Carol Cobb, a long-time researcher of her and Harold's family's history for many years, will show how Ancestry.com and other research platforms work and other learning avenues about your family.

She has always wished she had spoken more to her grandparents about their families. In researching, she has found out secrets that were either hidden or never discussed. With the new Clark Library on Lindbergh, their Genealogy Department has been expanded. Many platforms for research have extensive materials that are shared on the website. Carol will show you the possibilities of research, possible costs, and opportunities to see actual photographs and headstones of ancestors.

Census records are released every decade and provide amazing insights into the past. The 1940 census was just released in 2020. She will share some of the interesting stories she has shared with her family (Kieffer-French) and Harold's (Crawford/ Cobb), as well as her extensive collection of memorabilia.

She will share a special rum cake passed down through the Kieffer family and a story about her mother-in-law, Jewell Cobb, a devoted Baptist, and her reaction to the cake.

Who Are You, Jesus?

Mark 8:27-38

"Who do people say I am?"

Jesus is certainly brave in asking this question. Think about it. Would you really want to hear how someone perceived you? We all have an image we think we are putting out to the universe that is often perceived differently by others.

But Jesus, who is preparing his followers for his impending death — wants to see if the ragtag bunch is understanding the cost that comes with picking up the cross.

Of course, Peter, the one who leaps before looking, jumps right in with the bold proclamation, "You are the Messiah."

Good job, Peter. Even though you still don't quite understand what you just said. That will come — in time.

Your turn now. Who do you say Jesus is?

Before you give the Sunday school answer you were taught years ago, stop. Really give it some thought. Who would you say Jesus is for you right now? Your answer might just reveal where you are on your faith journey.

A pastor once asked a group of second graders the "Who is Jesus?" question. Their answers were of course adorable.

Jesus is my teddy bear. Jesus is my cookie monster. Jesus is my best pal. Jesus is my boo-boo healer.

A few years later, the pastor asked that same group of children, now teens preparing for confirmation, the same question. Who do you say Jesus is? This time, the answers were not so adorable. Rather, they were raw and revealing.

Jesus is my safe place. Jesus is my sponsor. Jesus is my secret keeper. Jesus is the parent I wished I had.

The reality is that there will be many different Jesus' who walk alongside us, being for us the unwavering love and hope needed as we change, grow and move on to new stages in life either willingly or unwillingly. And that is the beauty of our Lord's question. It reminds us that through it all, he is always exactly what we need.

Yes, Jesus is our Messiah. He is our Lord and Savior. He is also our Safe Place, our Secret Keeper, our Heartbreak Healer ...

Once again, it's your turn now. Spend some time in prayer, pondering Jesus' question that he asks of you: "Who do you say I am?"
