



Sending the Word Home For your spiritual nourishment during the week.

LAST WEEK in Sunday School

John the Baptist prepares people to follow Jesus. When he baptizes Jesus, Jesus is proclaimed as the Son of God (Luke 3:1-22).

TODAY in Sunday School

Jesus goes to his hometown and declares himself to be the Messiah, sent to those on the margins of society. The people become angry and intend to hurt Jesus, but he escaped unharmed (Luke 4:14-30).

THE POINT

Jesus brings good news to those in need.

BIBLE NUTS & BOLTS

In Luke's Gospel, we get a clear picture of what the kingdom of God looks like: God's children caring radically for each other and for those considered to be outsiders, indeed, caring for everyone no matter who they are. The kingdom of God is an important concept in all four Gospels, though Matthew refers to it as the kingdom of heaven. Everything Jesus says and does is intended to show us what life will be like in this kingdom. The kingdom of God is not something we are to sit around and patiently wait for. It is something God calls us to actively participate in right now.

STORY SUMMARY

Jesus returns to his hometown to teach at the synagogue. He is welcomed at first, but things take a turn for the worse. People become angered to the point of violence when they hear Jesus' message that God's radical love is for everyone, not just for them. Jesus uses passages from the prophet Isaiah to share this message-passages the Jews had been reading for hundreds of years for assurance that God's promises of salvation were for them, the Jews. It was shocking for these people to hear that Isaiah's message could be applied to other people.

PRACTICE: Worship

In today's story Jesus attends a synagogue, a place for prayer, teaching, and preaching. We, too, should make time for prayer, Scripture reading and reflection, and learning more about our faith. This week, use the daily readings provided as a chance to engage in worship as a family. Hear the words of Scripture, and reflect on how God is using them to teach you about God's love and plan for redemption of the whole world.

NEXT WEEK in Sunday School

Jesus reveals himself as a leader and teacher to fishermen, calling his first disciples (Luke 5:1-11).

The third Monday in January is a day of remembrance. It is the day we observe the birth of U.S. civil rights activist and Baptist minister Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. But did you know that this day is one of only two Congressionally Designated Days of Service, the other being September 11th? In 1994, President Bill Clinton signed the King Holiday and Service Act into law, 26 years after Dr. King's assassination. Dr. King envisioned a "Beloved Community," where people from all walks of life uplift each other. The Act calls Americans to take action and improve their communities. Acts of kindness don't need to be limited to one day or organization.

Simple gestures, like helping a neighbor with snow or offering a kind note, can create a lasting impact. Here are some ideas to spark your next act of kindness or plan for community involvement:

- Volunteer to be a book reader at your local elementary school and read a children's book about Dr. King or another activist
- Sign up to volunteer with Meals on Wheels America, an organization dedicated to addressing senior isolation and hunger
- Find a local volunteer opportunity through AmeriCorps Volunteer Search.
- Check out the MLK Day of Service website to find volunteer opportunities dedicated to celebrating Dr. King

Angels: The Untold Story of the Nurses Who Helped Cure Tuberculosis by

Maria Smilios. In the pre-antibiotic days when tuberculosis stirred people's darkest fears, killing one in seven, white nurses at Sea View, New York's largest municipal hospital, began quitting en masse. Desperate to avert a public health crisis, city officials summoned Black southern nurses, luring them with promises of good pay, a career, and an escape from the structures of Jim Crow. But after arriving, they found themselves on an isolated hilltop in the remote borough of Staten Island, yet again confronting racism and consigned to a woefully understaffed sanatorium. The book spans the Great Depression and moves through World War II and beyond. This true story follows the intrepid young women known by their patients as the "Black Angels." This book celebrates their legacy and spirit of survival.

TAD will read and discuss the book in 3 sessions, starting January 21, where we'll discuss section 2 of the book. Join in at 1:45pm for fellowship, or 2pm for book discussion.

January Eco Stewards News

December 2024 brought some good news on the environmental front. First, on December 18, youth in Montana won recognition from the Montana Supreme Court of their right to a secure future with clean air, free of pollution. The court recognized a "fundamental constitutional right to a clean and healthful environment," stated that greenhouse gas emissions are "proven to be a substantial factor in causing climate impacts to Montana's environment, and harm and injury to the youth plaintiffs," and overturned two recent laws that had weakened the Montana Environmental Policy Act.

Next, on December 26, Governor Kathy Hochul of New York signed into law the Climate Change Superfund Act. The legislation will require fossil fuel companies to pay \$75 billion, over the next 25 years, to fund state infrastructure projects to mitigate flooding, extreme heat, and recovery from natural disasters. The law requires the state Department of Environmental Conservation to collect \$3 billion each year for the next 25 years from responsible parties.

Two other states have superfund laws that make polluters pay, including Vermont, which supplied the model for the New York act. California, Maryland, Massachusetts and New Jersey have all proposed similar legislation. If you believe that Missouri should follow this model for covering the cost of damage from intensified weather patterns and flooding, let your state legislators know.

UCC Art Contest for Youth and Children

The UCC's 2025 Climate Hope Art Contest for children and youth has officially launched. The theme this year is "Planting Seeds of Hope." They'll accept art submissions from February 2 to March 14. Like last year, they will have winners for different age groups and an overall winner who will receive an all-expense paid trip to visit Washington, DC with a parent or guardian. (Last year's winner had two members of congress personally ask her for a poster of her artwork, so that they could hang it in their offices!) The winning art will additionally serve as the logo for UCC Climate Hope advocacy work throughout 2025. Register by scanning the OR code.

The Federal Government has proposed a plan to eliminate 14c, effective immediately for some sheltered workshops - places of employment, skill building, socialization and fun for adults with intellectual disabilities.

If 14c is repealed, sheltered workshops would be required to pay all workers minimum wage - even if some employees' expectations and goals are met without that wage. We have been told that many workshops could go out of business or need to let somewhere between 50-70% of their employees go because of funding.

If this becomes a ruling it will directly affect over 5,000 adults with developmental disabilities in Missouri. Please consider communicating your perspective about the positive impact sheltered workshops have on Alicia, her family, and our wider community.
