Scripture Luke 9:28-36 | New Revised Standard Version (NRSV)


Now about eight days after these sayings, Jesus took with him Peter and John and James, and went up on the mountain to pray. And while he was praying, the appearance of his face changed, and his clothes became dazzling white. Suddenly they saw two men, Moses and Elijah, talking to him. They appeared in glory and were speaking of his departure, which he was about to accomplish at Jerusalem. Now Peter and his companions were weighed down with sleep; but since they had stayed awake, they saw his glory and the two men who stood with him.

Just as they were leaving him, Peter said to Jesus, "Master, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah" — not knowing what he said.

While he was saying this, a cloud came and overshadowed them; and they were terrified as they entered the cloud. 



"The Immigration Crisis in 19th Century Missouri," by Historian Luke Ritter

Who counts as an American? It was a question that plagued 19th century politics, as German and Irish immigrants arrived in unprecedented numbers. On an election day in 1854, St. Louis witnessed one of the nation's largest anti-immigrant riots. Rioters sabotaged an election and murdered at least ten people. Sound familiar? Does history repeat itself? At least as to immigration fearmongering and the like, that appears to be the case. Historian Dr. Luke

Ritter, a faculty member at the St. Louis Community College, joins us to explain how American-immigrant tensions in Missouri manifested deeply felt anxieties about American identity and democracy amid rapid demographic change. He identifies patterns of behavior that have persisted across time and analyzes U.S. immigration policies, both past and present.

LAST WEEK in Sunday School

While Jesus was visiting a Pharisee, a woman who was called "sinful" by others wept at Jesus' feet and anointed them with expensive oil. Jesus give her mercy and forgiveness. (Luke 7:36-50).

TODAY in Sunday School

Jesus takes three disciples up a mountain, where he becomes dazzlingly white, and Moses and Elijah appear next to him. God declares that Jesus is God's Son, and the disciples should listen to him (Luke 9:28-45).

THE POINT

The Messiah has come to serve and calls us to serve others.

BIBLE NUTS & BOLTS

Much of the significance of the transfiguration story depends on our knowledge of Old Testament stories, especially those of Moses and Elijah. The presence of Moses connects Jesus to God's gift of the Torah and Israel's freedom from slavery. The presence of Elijah makes a connection to the prophets, the individuals who delivered God's messages to the people.

PRACTICE: Prayer

Since prayer at its heart is simply communicating with God, any time we express our thanks and praise to God is prayer! Words, poems, song, art—these are all ways we can express gratitude to God through prayer. This week, choose a new way to express your gratitude to God.

STORY SUMMARY

Jesus takes Peter, James, and John with him up a mountain to pray. As Jesus is praying, a great light appears and his physical appearance is changed. Moses and Elijah appear at his side. Peter, James, and John are overcome with awe. A cloud envelopes them all and a great voice is heard saying, "This is my Son, my Chosen; listen to him!" When the voice stops, the cloud goes away and Moses and Elijah disappear. When they come down from the mountain, a father approaches Jesus. His son is possessed by a demon. The father had asked Jesus' disciples to heal the boy but they had failed. Jesus criticizes the faithlessness of this generation and heals the boy in a dramatic fashion. Jesus tells his disciples that he will soon be betrayed.

NEXT WEEK in Sunday School

Jesus tells the Parable of the Good Samaritan, in which a person cares for his enemy. Then, Jesus visits sisters Mary and Martha and encourages Martha to rest from her work and listen to him (Luke 10:25-42).

GOING DEEPER

As you hear and study these stories each week, consider what God has to say to you and your family. What is God's message to us? Consider the following basic pattern as a way of forming family devotions:

- Light a candle to help you focus this time as "God time." Pray a simple prayer together.
- Take a moment to check in with each other; what are each person's "highs" and "lows" today?
- Read aloud from the Daily Bible Readings from below. Discuss the questions following each.
- End with a blessing, by simply tracing a cross on each other's forehead. The Lord's Prayer is a good way to end your devotion time. If you used a candle, extinguish it as a sign of the end of the devotions.

Note: This is only a suggested pattern. It will vary with your household's context and patterns. What works best for you? First thing in the morning? Over breakfast? Bedtime? Be creative and flexible with how you practice and keep your devotions!

DAILY BIBLE READINGS

SUNDAY: Luke 9:28-45

Jesus is named and claimed by God as the Messiah. When is a time when you felt transformed by the Holy Spirit?

MONDAY: Isaiah 55:1-3

God invites us to the abundant life. What material objects gave you momentary pleasure but then lost their appeal?

TUESDAY: Luke 9:46-50

Jesus teaches about the kingdom of God. What do you think Jesus meant when he said, "the least among you is the greatest"?

WEDNESDAY: Luke 9:51-62

As Jesus travels to Jerusalem, he is filled with a sense of urgency to fulfill his mission. What might Jesus ask you to stop doing so you could "proclaim the kingdom"?

THURSDAY: Luke 10:1-12

The mission of the seventy is explained. Why do you think Jesus told them not to bring money, a bag, or even extra shoes?

FRIDAY: Luke 10:17-20

Jesus equips his disciples with the power to heal and cast out demons. How might you feel if you were suddenly able to perform miracles?

SATURDAY: Luke 10:21-24

Jesus rejoices. How does it feel to know something big that only a few people, if any others, know?

Worth It

I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ. - Philippians 3:8 (NRSV)

For the past month, I've been on an organizational tear. I've opened every cabinet, drawer, and closet in my home, sorting through our stuff and ruthlessly donating things we don't use or need. Many of these discards were easy: laptops from 2010, bridesmaid dresses, CD collections that require long-lost boomboxes.

But a lot of them were harder for me. For example, books. How will people know I'm smart if my bookshelves aren't laden with tomes like Wuthering Heights and Christianity in Early Antiquity? And craft supplies—I may want to etch glass again someday! Really. I might!

The question that got me through these more complicated decisions was this: Will the joy outweigh the cost?

Will the freedom of extra closet space be nicer than the disappointment I'll feel if I finally find an occasion to wear that sequined top? Will every day that my kitchen drawers open smoothly offset the one day I need those special herb-cutting scissors I've used three times in the past five years?

Faith works like this, too. You have to make choices, sort through your values, lose some things. Some people might not like you because you're "always talking about race." Your family may miss Sunday morning soccer practice because of church. Life could get messy if you're arrested at a protest.

The promise of faith is that you will be freer with these losses than without them.

It's costly to claim your values fearlessly. It's hard to invest in meaningful community, especially in the face of competing priorities. It's risky to lay down your privilege, even a little, not knowing where it'll land you.

But faith is always asking: Will you lose your life to find it? Will the joy outweigh the cost? And faith is always promising it will.
