


Deliver me not into the hand of my adversaries, for false witnesses have risen up against me, and also those who speak malice.


Lenten Candles: Traveling with Jesus

We lit seven candles as we embarked on this Lenten journey. We want the light of the Holy to illumine our path as we seek to be the words and ways of Jesus. Scripture Luke 15:3, 11b-32 | Common English Bible (CEB)

Jesus told them this parable: "A certain man had two sons. The younger son said to his father, 'Father, give me my share of the inheritance.' Then the father divided his estate between them. Soon afterward, the younger son gathered everything together and took a trip to a land far away. There, he wasted his wealth through extravagant living.

"When he had used up his resources, a severe food shortage arose in that country, and he began to be in need. He hired himself out to one of the citizens of that country, who sent him into his fields to feed pigs. He longed to eat his fill from what the pigs ate, but no one gave him anything. When he came to his senses, he said, 'How many of my father's hired hands have more than enough food, but I'm starving to death! I will get up and go to my father, and say to him, "Father, I have sinned against heaven and against you. I no longer deserve to be called your son. Take me on as one of your hired hands." So, he got up and went to his father.

"While he was still a long way off, his father saw him and was moved with compassion. His father ran to him, hugged him, and kissed him. Then his son said, 'Father, I have sinned against heaven and against you. I no longer deserve to be called your son.' But the father said to his servants, 'Quickly, bring out the best robe and put it on him! Put a ring on his finger and sandals on his feet! Fetch the fattened calf and slaughter it. We must celebrate with feasting because this son of mine was dead and has come back to life! He was lost and is found!' And they began to celebrate.

"Now his older son was in the field. Coming in from the field, he approached the house and heard music and dancing. He called one of the servants and asked what was going on. The servant replied, 'Your brother has arrived, and your father has slaughtered the fattened calf because he received his son back safe and sound.' Then the older son was furious and didn't want to enter in, but his father came out and begged him. He answered his father, 'Look, I've served you all these years, and I never disobeyed your instruction. Yet you've never given me as much as a young goat so I could celebrate with my friends. But when this son of yours returned, after gobbling up your estate on prostitutes, you slaughtered the fattened calf for him.' Then his father said, 'Son, you are always with me, and everything I have is yours. But we had to celebrate and be glad because this brother of yours was dead and is alive. He was lost and is found."



March Eco Steward Article Single use plastic water bottles facts and concerns

Plastic water bottle pollution is a significant issue affecting personal health, the environment, and climate change. These bottles contribute to ocean pollution, threatening marine life, and may leach harmful chemicals that disrupt hormones or release carbon dioxide. While convenient, plastic water bottles cause serious environmental harm.

Low Recycling Rate

Only one out of four plastic water bottles that are bought are recycled. This means that 75% of the water bottles that are purchased are just thrown out in the garbage, and are taking up space in our landfills, which are filling up quickly.

Plastic Pollutes our Oceans & Beaches

Each year, about one-tenth of all plastic produced ends up in the oceans, with plastic water bottles being a significant contributor. These bottles often wash up on beaches or settle on the ocean floor, creating serious environmental issues. The plastics harm local ecosystems and pose a threat to sea life and wildlife that ingest them.

"Not so" Fun facts about single use plastic bottle water include:

- A single-use plastic bottle takes around 450 years to decompose.
- Only 29% of plastic water bottles in the U.S. are recycled.
- Single-use plastic bottles are the third-largest ocean trash item.
- Americans buy nearly 15 billion gallons of bottled water per year.
- If just one person moves to using a reusable water bottle, approximately 217 plastic water bottles will be saved from going to a landfill that year.

LAST WEEK in Sunday School

Jesus tells the Parable of the Good Samaritan, in which a person cares for his enemy. Then, Jesus visits sisters Mary and Martha and encourages Martha to rest from her work and listen to him (Luke 10:25-42).

TODAY in Sunday School

Jesus tells people that bad things do not happen because of people's sins, but he calls the people to change their ways. Then, he tells some Pharisees that he is going to Jerusalem be killed (Luke 13:1-9, 31-35).

THE POINT

Suffering is not always caused by our sin, but everyone should repent.

BIBLE NUTS & BOLTS

Bible passages can be difficult to understand and, in some cases, difficult to accept. The first step to understanding a Bible passage is to pray and ask for God's help. After seeking God, it is helpful to work through difficult passages with an understanding of historical context. Sometimes, things were acceptable in the biblical context that are no longer acceptable today, and other things were simply understood differently. Finally, one can use the central message of Scripture-God's love and forgiveness-as a way to interpret other passages. At the core of the entire Bible is God's deep love for God's people.

STORY SUMMARY

Jesus gives us three ways to understand how much he is offering us and how much we need him. The tragedies that Jesus mentions—Pilate's murders during worship, a building collapse, and a frustrated farmer—all speak to our tendency to look for blame when bad things happen. Jesus teaches us that tragedies are not God's punishment for our sins. But any reminder of our sins should lead us to repentance, which means we change our thinking patterns and turn our life in a new direction—toward God.

PRACTICE: Service

Repentance is more that feeling sorry for your sins. It involves commitment and action, turning from your own path to God's path. And God's path includes loving service toward other people. Practice finding the good that comes out of tragedy. Do a web search for positive stories after a disaster. Think of your own examples and give thanks for people who do good in troubling times.

NEXT WEEK in Sunday School

Jesus tells parables about a lost sheep, a lost coin, and a lost son. God never stops seeking people who feel lost or have wandered from God's way. When someone returns, all the angels celebrate (Luke 15:1-32).

GOING DEEPER

As you hear and study these stories each week, consider what God has to say to you and your family. What is God's message to us? Consider the following basic pattern as a way of forming family devotions:

- Light a candle to help you focus this time as "God time." Pray a simple prayer together.
- Take a moment to check in with each other; what are each person's "highs" and "lows" today?
- * Read aloud from the Daily Bible Readings from below. Discuss the questions following each.
- End with a blessing, by simply tracing a cross on each other's forehead. The Lord's Prayer is a good way to end your devotion time. If you used a candle, extinguish it as a sign of the end of the devotions.

Note: This is only a suggested pattern. It will vary with your household's context and patterns. What works best for you? First thing in the morning? Over breakfast? Bedtime? Be creative and flexible with how you practice and keep your devotions!

DAILY BIBLE READINGS

SUNDAY: Luke 13:1-9, 31-35

Jesus wants us to trust God in the middle of tragedy. What are some ways you can turn around to live a better life?

MONDAY: Luke 13:10-17

When we do God's work, and when we say thanks to God, it is the Lord's day. Who can you be thankful for this week?

TUESDAY: Luke 13:18-30

We are never too small to do God's work, and there is no task that is impossible with the help of God. Imagine helping someone feel the love of God. How will you accomplish that?

WEDNESDAY: Luke 14:1-6

Jesus did not wait for just the right time or just the right words. He called on God for assistance and preached, taught, and healed. Where do you serve God in your everyday life outside of church?

THURSDAY: Luke 14:7-14

Jesus challenges the normal way of doing things by asking his followers to break some rules. What are some ways to help those who do not fit in find a place in your worship space?

FRIDAY: Luke 14:15-24

Jesus knows that not everyone will want to be part of what he calls the great banquet. Who would you invite to God's banquet to help them see God's love?

SATURDAY: Luke 14:25-33

It is not supposed to always be easy to follow Jesus. If we avoid the tough times, we are missing out on the depth of God's love. How can we prepare ourselves for difficult times so that we depend on God to get us through?
