Scripture Jeremiah 18:1-11 | New Revised Standard Version Updated Edition The word that came to Jeremiah from the Lord: "Come, go down to the potter's house, and there I will let you hear my words."

So I went down to the potter's house, and there he was working at his wheel. The vessel he was making of clay was spoiled in the potter's hand, and he reworked it into another vessel, as seemed good to him.

Then the word of the Lord came to me: Can I not do with you, O house of Israel, just as this potter has done? says the Lord. Just like the clay in the potter's hand, so are you in my hand, O house of Israel. Psaiter Lesson Psalm 139:1-6, 13-18 | NRSVUE O Lord, you have searched me and known me. You know when I sit down and when I rise up;

you discern my thoughts from far away. You search out my path and my lying down

and are acquainted with all my ways. Even before a word is on my tongue,

O Lord, you know it completely. You hem me in, behind and before, and lay your hand upon me.

Such knowledge is too wonderful for me; it is so high that I cannot attain it.

For it was you who formed my inward parts: you knit me together in my mother's womb. I praise you, for I am fearfully and wonderfully made. Wonderful are your works: that I know very well. My frame was not hidden from you, when I was being made in secret. intricately woven in the depths of the earth. Your eves beheld my unformed substance. In your book were written all the days that were formed for me, when none of them as vet existed. How weighty to me are your thoughts, O God! How vast is the sum of them! I try to count them—they are more than the sand; I come to the end—I am still with you.

New Testament Lesson Philemon, selected verses | NRSVUE

I thank God always when I mention you in my prayers, because I hear of your love for all the saints and your faith toward the Lord Jesus. I pray that the partnership of your faith may become effective as you comprehend all the good that we share in Christ. I have indeed received much joy and encouragement from your love, because the hearts of the saints have been refreshed through you.

For this reason, though I am more than bold enough in Christ to command you to do the right thing, yet I would rather appeal to you on the basis of love - and I, Paul, do this as an old man and now also as a prisoner of Christ Jesus. I am appealing to you for my child, Onesimus, whose father I have become during my imprisonment. Formerly he was useless to you, but now he is indeed useful to you and to me. I am sending him, that is, my own heart, back to you. I wanted to keep him with me so that he might minister to me in your place during my imprisonment for the gospel, but I preferred to do nothing without your consent in order that your good deed might be voluntary and not something forced. Perhaps this is the reason he was separated from you for a while, so that you might have him back for the long term, no longer as a slave but more than a slave, a beloved brother - especially to me but how much more to you, both in the flesh and in the Lord.

So if you consider me your partner, welcome him as you would welcome me. If he has wronged you in any way or owes you anything, charge that to me. I, Paul, am writing this with my own hand: I will repay it. I say nothing about your owing me even your own self. Yes, brother, let me have this benefit from you in the Lord! Refresh my heart in Christ. Confident of your obedience, I am writing to you, knowing that you will do even more than I ask.

One thing more: prepare a guest room for me, for I am hoping through your prayers to be restored to you.

Epaphras, my fellow prisoner in Christ Jesus, sends greetings to you, and so do Mark, Aristarchus, Demas, and Luke, my coworkers.

The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ be with your spirit.

[Jesus taught them, saying,] "Beware of false prophets, who come to you in sheep's clothing but inwardly are ravenous wolves. You will know them by their fruits. Are grapes gathered from thorns, or figs from thistles? In the same way, every good tree bears good fruit, but the bad tree bears bad fruit." – Matthew 7:15-17 (NRSV)

Ichnology is the study of trace fossils. Not the big T-Rex skeleton at your natural history museum. Or even the shark's teeth you hunt for in the creek behind your house. Not fossils of the thing itself at all, only of the traces it left behind.

Million-year-old footprints frozen in stone. Tunnels and burrows preserved for posterity. Bite marks and claw marks etched into bone. The ichnologist studies not what was there but what it did. Or rather, she studies what was there by studying what it did.

Which Jesus says is also how you'll know who really speaks for God.

Not by who they are, which can be deceiving. Not by their position, denomination, nationality ... not by looking at them at all. But only at what they did, how they lived, what remains:

The tracks they made marching in solidarity with those who were suffering. The tunnels they dug to undermine systems of injustice and oppression. The evidence they left of fighting tooth and nail in the cause of love.

The good that came from it all.

"You will know them by their fruits." By what they left behind. Their traces. Which live on, long after they are gone.

TODAY in Sunday School

The Bible begins with the story of creation. This is a story of beginnings. In fact, our name for this book of the Bible, Genesis, comes from the Greek word for "origin" (Genesis 1:1–2:4a).

THE POINT

God declares that creation is good.

BIBLE NUTS & BOLTS

The Old Testament contains the first 39 books in the Protestant Bible. It is a collection of ancient texts that were originally written in Hebrew and Aramaic and later translated to other languages, including English. The writing of the Old Testament spanned 500 years. The Christian Old Testament is organized into categories: the Law, the History, Poetry, and the Prophets (major and minor). Although the individual books in the Old Testament are separate writings, collectively they tell a story of a loving God who wants a relationship with humanity.

STORY SUMMARY

In the beginning, God made order out of chaos. God began with nothing and created the world and all that is in it through a step-bystep process. That ordered process demonstrated care for the big picture and care for the details. As God paused to view the progress after each step, God was pleased that it was good. God was uniquely involved in preparing good things in creation to be a blessing to humanity. We are a part of God's creation, created in God's image, and as God continues to bless us, we can be a blessing to others as well.

PRACTICE: Worship

Worship is any way that we show God our love. When we admire and express our enjoyment of God's creation, we worship God. We can praise God for the world around us, for the grass, the oceans, the mountains, and the foliage. As a family, enjoy the outdoors through a walk or an outdoor game. At various times in this experience, take turns thanking God for specific parts of creation around you.

NEXT WEEK in Sunday School

After a very long time waiting, the son that God promised is born to Abraham and Sarah: Isaac (Genesis 21:1-3; 22:1-14).

GOING DEEPER

As you hear and study these stories each week, consider what God has to say to you and your family. What is God's message to us? Consider the following basic pattern as a way of forming family devotions:

- ❖ Light a candle to help you focus this time as "God time." Pray a simple prayer together.
- Take a moment to check in with each other; what are each person's "highs" and "lows" today?
- Read aloud from the Daily Bible Readings from below. Discuss the questions following each.
- End with a blessing, by simply tracing a cross on each other's forehead. The Lord's Prayer is a good way to end your devotion time. If you used a candle, extinguish it as a sign of the end of the devotions.

Note: This is only a suggested pattern. It will vary with your household's context and patterns. What works best for you? First thing in the morning? Over breakfast? Bedtime? Be creative and flexible with how you practice and keep your devotions!

DAILY BIBLE READINGS

SUNDAY: Genesis 1:1-2:4a

God was pleased with entire creation and called it good. What does it mean to you to be created in God's image?

MONDAY: Genesis 2:7-9, 15, 18-25

Adam and Eve were given the responsibility to tend and take care of the land. What is your responsibility in taking care of God's creation?

TUESDAY: Genesis 3:8-19

Sin changed humanity's relationship with the earth as well as humanity's relationship with God. What consequences have you experienced for choices you made?

WEDNESDAY: Genesis 12:1-9

God called Abram to leave all that he knew and follow God to a land God knew. Along with that call was a promise for great blessings. Why do we receive blessings from God?

THURSDAY: Genesis 15:1-6

God made a covenant with Abram, promising that his descendants would be as numerous as the stars. If we are descendants of Abram (Abraham), who are our siblings?

FRIDAY: Genesis 17:15-21

God changed Abram's name to Abraham (Gen. 17:5) and Sarai's to Sarah (17:15). God promised them a son who would continue the covenant. If your name was an adjective, what would you want it to be?

SATURDAY: Genesis 18:1-15

The Lord appeared to Abraham through three visitors near the trees at Mamre. What food would you serve if God visited you?
