Scripture Matthew 2:1-12 | Common English Bible—CEB

After Jesus was born in Bethlehem in the territory of Judea during the rule of King Herod, magi came from the east to Jerusalem. They asked, “Where is the newborn king of the Jews? We’ve seen his star in the east, and we’ve come to honor him.”

When King Herod heard this, he was troubled, and everyone in Jerusalem was troubled with him. He gathered all the chief priests and the legal experts and asked them where the Christ was to be born. They said, “In Bethlehem of Judea, for this is what the prophet wrote:

*You, Bethlehem, land of Judah,
by no means are you least among the rulers of Judah,
because from you will come one who governs,
who will shepherd my people Israel.”*

Then Herod secretly called for the magi and found out from them the time when the star had first appeared. He sent them to Bethlehem, saying, “Go and search carefully for the child. When you’ve found him, report to me so that I too may go and honor him.”

When they heard the king, they went; and look, the star they had seen in the east went ahead of them until it stood over the place where the child was. When they saw the star, they were filled with joy. They entered the house and saw the child with Mary his mother. Falling to their knees, they honored him. Then they opened their treasure chests and presented him with gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. Because they were warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they went back to their own country by another road.

Scripture *Isaiah 60:1-6 | New Revised Standard Version—NRSV*

Arise, shine; for your light has come, and the glory of the Lord has risen upon you. For darkness shall cover the earth, and thick darkness the peoples; but the Lord will arise upon you, and glory will appear over you. Nations shall come to your light, and kings to the brightness of your dawn.

Lift up your eyes and look around; they all gather together, they come to you; your sons shall come from far away, and your daughters shall be carried on their nurses' arms.

Then you shall see and be radiant; your heart shall thrill and rejoice, because the abundance of the sea shall be brought to you, the wealth of the nations shall come to you...

A multitude of camels shall cover you, the young camels of Midian and Ephah; all those from Sheba shall come. They shall bring gold and frankincense, and shall proclaim the praise of the Lord.

Scripture Matthew 2:1-12 | The Message—MSG

After Jesus was born in Bethlehem village, Judah territory - this was during Herod's kingship—a band of scholars arrived in Jerusalem from the East. They asked around, “Where can we find and pay homage to the newborn King of the Jews? We observed a star in the eastern sky that signaled his birth. We're on pilgrimage to worship him.”

When word of their inquiry got to Herod, he was terrified - and not Herod alone, but most of Jerusalem as well. Herod lost no time. He gathered all the high priests and religion scholars in the city together and asked, “Where is the Messiah supposed to be born?”

They told him, “Bethlehem, Judah territory. The prophet Micah wrote it plainly:

It's you, Bethlehem, in Judah's land, no longer bringing up the rear.
From you will come the leader who will shepherd-rule my people, my Israel.”

Herod then arranged a secret meeting with the scholars from the East. Pretending to be as devout as they were, he got them to tell him exactly when the birth-announcement star appeared. Then he told them the prophecy about Bethlehem, and said, “Go find this child. Leave no stone unturned. As soon as you find him, send word and I'll join you at once in your worship.”

Instructed by the king, they set off. Then the star appeared again, the same star they had seen in the eastern skies. It led them on until it hovered over the place of the child. They could hardly contain themselves: They were in the right place! They had arrived at the right time!

They entered the house and saw the child in the arms of Mary, his mother. Overcome, they kneeled and worshiped him. Then they opened their luggage and presented gifts: gold, frankincense, myrrh.

In a dream, they were warned not to report back to Herod. So they worked out another route, left the territory without being seen, and returned to their own country.

So, send us out, shining with borrowed light, to notice where your presence is breaking through - in voices long ignored, in truths newly revealed, in the courage it takes to choose a different road home. May this meal strengthen us to resist injustice, to welcome the stranger, to trust that revelation continues, and to follow your light even when it leads us beyond what is familiar. We go now, nourished and changed, ready to live what we have tasted: love that crosses borders, hope that disrupts fear, and justice that reflects your glory. Amen.

"Bletchley Park; the Home of WWII's Codebreakers," by Parks Smith.

Sunday, January 18 | 11:15am | Heritage Room

Bletchley Park, in England, was the top-secret home of the World War II "Codebreakers." a term for the over 9,000 men and women who intercepted and cracked German war messages. Winston Churchill referred to the Bletchley staff as "the geese who laid the golden eggs and never cackled." Our speakers, Parks Smith, is a retired St. Louisan historian, who often speaks at the St. Louis History Museum.

Mr. Smith will explore Bletchley Park's history from 1939 to 1946, sharing stories of those who worked there and detailing how German messages were captured and decoded during the Battle of the Atlantic. This mighty effort included breaking the German Enigma and Lorenz codes and developing the Colossus computer.

Witnessing Whiteness PUCC Study Group begins in January

We're forming a *Witnessing Whiteness* learning circle using Shelly Tochluk's book *Witnessing Whiteness: The Journey into Racial Awareness and Antiracist Action* as our framework. This approach was created here in St Louis through the YWCA and become timelier and more necessary after Michael Brown was killed over ten years ago.

It's a supportive, no-shame space where white-identifying people can explore identity, grow in self-awareness, and practice showing up with more courage, compassion, and clarity in our diverse and hurting world. White people need to learn what black, indigenous and people of color already know about their history and the systems that effect them every day in America.

No expertise is needed - just curiosity and a willingness to reflect in community. This will take place on Zoom - Mondays 6:30-8:30pm - so it doesn't matter where you live or if you travel.

There are examples of racist, xenophobic and deeply rooted prejudice in the news every day. Unfortunately, some of the most powerful people in our land are attempting to rewrite our nation's racial history and are continuing to create and sustain systems of bias. We cannot allow this to happen. This is not what love does.

[Please see an example of this in the eNews in a rebuttal to JD Vance after he encouraged an audience to ignore conversations about race. This is one of the reasons why we white people must engage in the work of being antiracists.]

We have the right and duty to do what we can to understand the roots of this behavior and to be very intentional about being as antiracist as we can be. Rooted in Faith and Justice: Christian Calls to Conscience & Cries for Peace in Palestine

Thursdays, starting February 5 | 6pm | Zoom

In the December, the Church Council adopted a motion to the affirmation of certain principles from the General Synod 35 Resolution “Declaration for an End to Genocide in Palestine.” We *affirm* that all are made in God’s image and are deserving of life free from oppression, persecution, and violence. We *reject* any theology or ideology including Christian Zionism, Supercessionism, antisemitism, anti-Arab, anti-Palestinian, or anti-Islam bias that would privilege or exclude any one nation, race, culture or religion within God’s universal economy of grace.

Parkway United Church of Christ is encouraged to receive this Resolution as a prophetic call and commit to: Stand in solidarity with oppressed people, domestic and abroad, and to denounce any atrocities whether that be through the context of public witness, legislative advocacy, legal action, or non-violent direct action; and denounce hate and violence in all its forms including that rooted in Islamophobia, anti-Palestinian and anti-Arab bias, and antisemitism, as contrary to the teachings of Jesus and the love of God for all humanity.

In an effort to live into this, we’ll be offering a five-week reading club of *Rooted in Faith and Justice* over Zoom. The book offers a powerful and enlightening perspective through the eyes of Palestinian Christian leaders and thinkers, helping us to understand the complexities and injustices of the Israeli-Palestinian conflict. Rested and Ready

[Jesus said to them,] “Beware, keep alert, for you don’t know when the time will come. And what I say to you I say to all: Keep awake.” - Mark 13:33, 37 (NRSVUE)

Against my better judgement, there I was: downtown on New Year’s Eve in 1999, joining the countdown when I should’ve been in a bunker. “10, 9, 8...” Just several more seconds until ... something? Surely existence itself set its clock to Eastern Standard Time, and the stroke of midnight would usher in the End of History. “3, 2, 1...” Nothing. Y2K came and went. The countdown was a letdown after such a buildup.

What did we think would happen at such an arbitrary time? It seems kind of silly now. And yet there are those who remain alert and hyper-vigilant, prepared for the worst. Calendar coincidences, astronomical and astrological events, wars and rumors of wars lead us to calculate apocalyptic dates. But we can never know when the time will come.

Constant vigilance is exhausting and counterproductive. And being caught unaware and unprepared is a risk. Our reality is less about a divinely ordered end time and more about human-caused existential threats. We can’t close our eyes to these things, yet injustice-induced insomnia leaves us too depleted to respond when the moment arrives. So how can we be rested and ready?

What if rather than keeping awake, we kept prepared and connected? Instead of stockpiling canned goods, let’s stockpile our communities with mutual care. Some will keep awake while we rest, and rest while we keep awake, trusting that all will be prepared when the moment calls.

And for this, there is no mysterious future date—because the time is now.

Prayer:

Call us into connection and community so that we are rested and ready for a time such as this. Amen.

TODAY In Sunday School

John the Baptist confirms that he is not the light when he says that he is neither the Messiah nor Elijah nor a prophet (John 1:19-34). Jesus' first disciples follow him (John 1:35-51).

THE POINT

As disciples, we follow Jesus, the Lamb of God

BIBLE NUTS & BOLTS

In Roman culture, a gospel (lit. good news) was an announcement that honored emperors by calling their birthdays and arrivals in cities "good news." In the New Testament, writers used the word to apply instead to the birth, life, ministry, death, and resurrection of Jesus. A gospel is a little like a spiritual biography that contains words of hope that have the power to transform the lives of the hearers. There are four Gospels in the Bible: Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John. The history, letters, and apocalyptic writings that make up the rest of the New Testament are all grounded in the testimony of these Gospel narratives.

STORY SUMMARY

People asked John the Baptist if he was the Messiah. He said that he was not, but he was preparing the way for the Messiah through a baptism with water. John saw Jesus and proclaimed him to be the Lamb of God, and some of John's disciples began to follow Jesus. In Galilee, Jesus called Philip to follow, and Philip invited Nathanael to come and see the Messiah. Jesus' remarks convinced Nathanael that Jesus was the Son of God.

PRACTICE: Prayer

In today's story, we hear about those who chose to "come and see," follow Jesus, and learn from his life. We cannot see Jesus in the same way, but we can still follow Jesus by reflecting on his words and stories in Scripture and communicating with him today through prayer. Find a place in or near your home where you can silently walk and pray.

NEXT WEEK In Sunday School

Jesus' public ministry begins with a miracle at a wedding in Cana. When the wine runs out, Jesus transforms water into wine, providing more than enough for the needs of the feast (John 2:1-11).
